

Pendleton Round-Up Slated September 11-14

Less than a week remains before the opening of the 1968 Pendleton Round-Up, September 11 through 14, according to Round-Up President Leonard King. The Round-Up season will be officially opened September 7 with the annual Dress-Up Parade in downtown Pendleton. Sponsored by the Main Street Cowboys, the colorful parade draws spectators as well as participants and floats from surrounding communities. The parade is free to the public and precedes the first of the Happy Canyon dances, the Cowboy Shuffle, in the Pendleton Memorial Armory.

This year's Round-Up Queen is Mary Thompson of Adams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Thompson, of Adams. Her four princesses are Gayle Rosenberg, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Rosenberg of Pendleton; Melissa Davis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Davis, Baker; Linda Levy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lou Levy of Pendleton; and Susan Lindstrom, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Lindstrom of Ione.

Some 263 RCA cowboys were on hand for the 1967 Round-Up, and a similar number is expected to try for a portion of the approximate \$36,000 in prize money this year. With such a large field of entries in 1967, the Round-Up became a five-day event for the first time since the show opened here in 1910. This year's entries are expected to top the 1967 mark for another five-day run. The long show period is due to the large number of calf roping, steer roping, and bulldogging entries and the first go-round action is expected to be Tuesday afternoon, September 10.

Cowboys are expected to arrive for the 57th annual event the week beginning September 8.

The Family plan package entertainment includes tickets to the Round-Up afternoon show, the beef barbecue and the Happy Canyon pageant for opening day, Wednesday, September 11. The plan includes any couple and their children for the price of \$12.50. During the beef barbecue free pony rides will be provided for the children. Tickets are on sale at the Round-Up office through September 7. All seats are reserved.

Six Rodeo Cowboys Associa-

tion approved events are on the Round-Up program this year and include calf roping, bareback and saddle bronc riding, brahma bull riding, steer roping and steer wrestling. In addition, there will be free-for-all squaw races, Indian relay race, Pony Express races, baton relay races, Indian tribal dancing in the arena, a wild cow milking contest and a wild horse race.

The action-packed four-day Pendleton Round-Up is held annually during the second week of September in the Round-Up grounds with seating capacity for approximately 16,000 spectators.

State Timber Sale Income \$4,830,400

Timber sale income from forest lands under the administration of the State Forestry Department totaled almost \$5,260,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30. Oregon counties received about \$2,642,000 of this, while some \$1,303,000 went to the state's common school fund. Management of these forest lands cost \$1,315,000 including land cost retirement, reforestation and timber sale administration.

In northwestern Oregon, state managed forest lands produced almost \$1,694,000 of this revenue. Almost \$914,800 of this was distributed in Tillamook County and another \$633,800 went to Clatsop County. Columbia County received more than \$91,800 with income in Washington and Clackamas counties amounting to \$49,000 and \$5,000 respectively. Sales from lands administered in the city of Forest Grove brought in \$106.

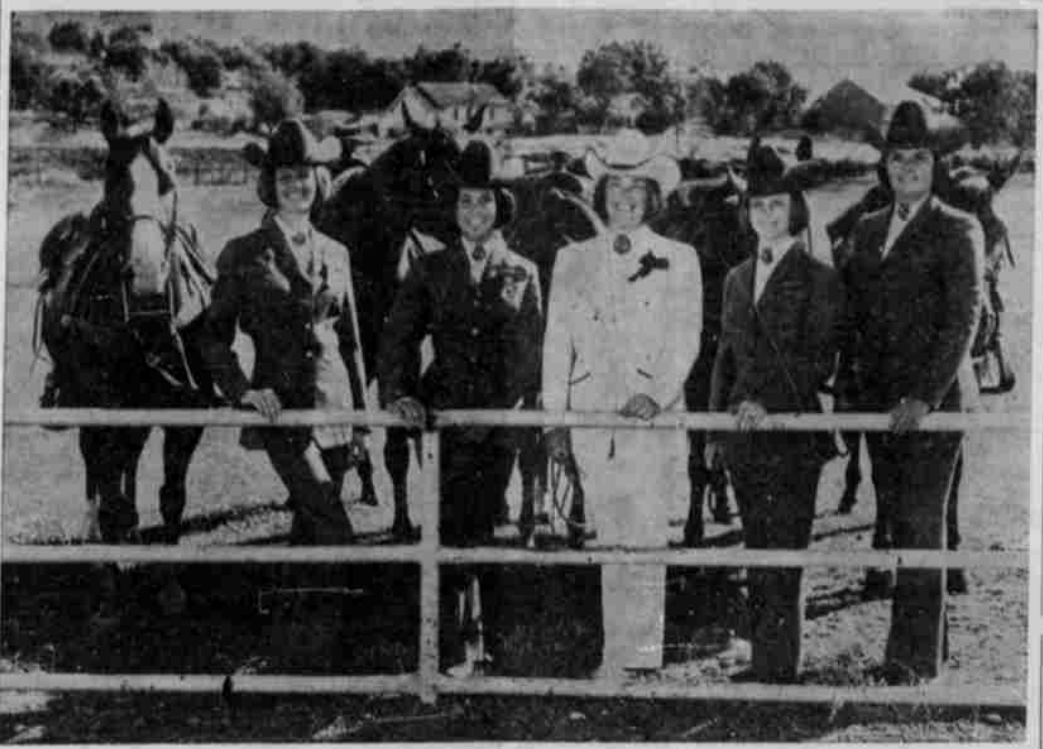
In the Willamette area, state lands brought in more than \$335,000 for the counties. Lane County led the sales again this year with \$155,600, followed by Marion County with nearly \$129,500. Other sales from the valley counties produced \$43,800 for Benton County and \$77,300 for Lincoln County. Linn County got \$44,000 and Polk County \$84,800.

Southwest area sales amounted to \$400,700 with Coos County receiving \$223,200 and Douglas County \$177,400.

Klamath County in eastern Oregon received almost \$11,900.

Pilot Training Approved at BMCC

Blue Mountain Community College's new Pilot Training School has been approved by the Federal Aviation Administration, it is announced by Wallace W. McCrae, college president.

An Air Agency Certificate issued by the FAA authorizes the college to operate an approved pilot school with both a basic and advanced ground school. The pilot training program is a two-year curriculum leading to a commercial pilot's license with instrument rating. Coordinator of the program for the college is Larry O'Rourke.

The course is designed for full-time students who wish to acquire an associate degree in one of five major fields of study and at the same time earn a commercial pilot's license. Major fields of study in which applicants may enroll are: Business education, civil engineering technology, electronic engineering technology, mechanical technology, and liberal arts.
