"McCabe looks much better this year and has tremendous desire," the mentor said, and he mentioned that Dean Wright, freshman, is a fine prospect with good weight and showing excellent kicking ability.

Offense to Be Same

Offense this year will be about the same as last year, using the I and T with slots and wings. Some changes will be made on defense, the coach said.

The squad has some excellent receivers in Murray, Huson and LaVerne VanMater, freshman, who could become the best of all receivers, the coach said. Bill Baker, although only 5-10 and 147, is also a good receiver.

"If we can throw the ball anywhere near them, we will be all right," Hienstra stated.

The Condon game is the only non-league game this season under the new Greater Oregon round-robin play. Vale and Nyssa are out of Oregon competition this year, and winner of the round robin will go directly into the state playoffs.

It is expected that next year, Vale and Nyssa will return to the fold and the Greater Oregon will divide into an east-west split.

Little information has been received on the Blue Devils for the opener. Coach Hienstra said that he expects them to be big but not too fast.

Mike Negus Named Morse Coordinator

Mike Negus, 23, the son of Sheriff and Mrs. Tom Negus of John Day, has been appointed field coordinator for Morrow county by the 1968 Re-Elect Wayne Morse Committee.

Negus, a 1962 graduate of Mt. Vernon High school, recently joined the campaign staff of Oregon Democratic Senator Wayne Morse.

He will be responsible for volunteer and organizational work in all of Eastern Oregon, in addition to Morrow county.

Born and raised in Grant County, Negus met Wayne Morse through his father, also a Democrat, when he was a youngster.

"Senator Morse has always been a hero to me," Negus said. "It has been a long-time ambition of mine to work with a first-rate statesman."

He has been attending Portland State College since completion of his military duties in June, 1967.

Negus graduated from Pacific Business College in Portland in 1964. He has been active in the Young Democrats and is a member of the U. S. Army Reserve.

A fifth generation Oregonian, Negus lettered in basketball, football, baseball and track in high school, was a member of the National Honor Society, and was editor of his high school newspaper.

October 5 Final Day to Register For Fall Election

Those who are not registered to vote in the general election on November 5—or who may be unsure of their registered status—have only until Saturday, October 5, to sign up or check their standing.

Mrs. Sadie Parrish, county clerk, points out that the deadline is October 5, and her office will be open on the Saturday for late-comers. However, she points out that it is desirable if all take care of the matter early. There is considerably more interest in voting in a presidential election year, and she urges all qualified persons to check now to be sure that they are properly registered.

A person may register at the clerk's office in the courthouse or through a registrar at other locations in the county. By telephoning the clerk (676-9915) the person may learn the location of the registrar nearest him.

Those desiring to register even though they do not reach 21 until just before the election, it is not necessary to be 21 by the registration deadline.

Those new to the county may vote on all positions on the ballot if they are here six months prior to election. If they are not here six months prior to election, they may vote on special certificates obtainable through the clerk, for president and vice president positions only.

Those who have other questions on registration and voting may obtain the answers from Mrs. Parrish.

Current registration in Morrow county is 2149, including both parties, but Secretary of State Clay Myers last week estimated that another 700 could be added to the voting lists in Morrow county if all qualified persons signed up.

It is expected that demand for absentee ballots will be greater than usual this election, particularly with the large number of servicemen in Vietnam and on duty elsewhere.

Families and friends are advised to remind those persons away from home to write at once to the county clerk to apply for absentee ballots.

Anticipating this unusual demand, Mrs. Parrish said Tuesday that ballots are now being prepared for printing so that they may be ready early and supply the demand from absentees. The Gazette-Times will do the printing job.

Churches Name Interim Pastor

Rev. O. D. Harris, Pendleton, has been chosen to serve as interim pastor for the Heppner and Lexington First Christian churches.

Rev. Harris, retired, served as pastor for the Pendleton First Christian church for many years. He plans to commute from Pendleton on week-ends, and will serve until a permanent minister is chosen.

He replaces the Rev. Al Bosche, who recently moved with his family to La Grande, where he is serving as manager of the Juvenile Department for Union county.

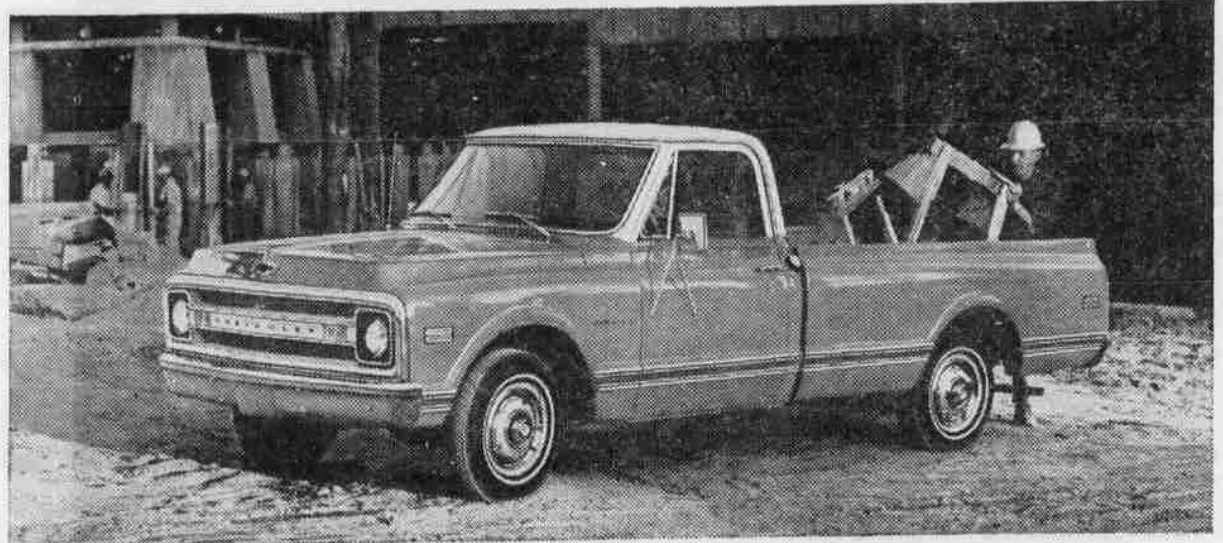
