Duplicate Licenses Policy is Changed

Department of Motor Vehicles of the State of Oregon no longer requires individuals seeking duplicate driver licenses to apply for them in person. Mrs. Elvira Irby, deputy in the office of Sheriff C. J. D. Bauman, states:

Individuals no longer are required to submit identification to process applications for duplicates. This will permit the department to accept mailed applications, and it is expected that it will encourage more persons to apply for a duplicate when the original license is lost or mislaid.
