Foremost on the agenda of the September meeting of the Irrigon City Council was a petition for vacation of an alley. This request, presented by attorney Smallmon in behalf of the Middle Columbia Conference of Seventh-day Adventist churches, involves the North-South alley in Block 36, in which a school building was constructed prior to the city's incorporation in 1956. The building has since been remodeled to serve as a residence and cannot be moved feasibly as it is on a concrete slab.

At a continuation meeting on Wednesday evening the Council met on the premises involved and authorized necessary legal action for the vacation. The

utility easement rights are to be retained by the City in the alley when vacated as well as those granted by the petitioners across property owned by them in the rear of the building.

Other Tuesday night business included hearing a progress report on drilling of the City well; adopting a resolution regarding transfer of funds; authorizing advertising to call for bids to furnish approximately 900 yards of crushed rock; also office vacancies were announced for three councilmen and one for municipal judge in the November general election. Four year council offices expiring, and to be filled, are those of James Keith, Sr., Margie Shade and Vernon Stewart. The judge position is now held by Vestie Elgin.

Candidates names may be placed on the ballot for these offices either by declaration or by petition. Either forms may be secured from Recorder Marilyn Stewart and filed with her at least 15 days prior to the election. Those carrying a petition to have a name placed on the ballot must also secure an affidavit from that person that they will serve in the office if elected.

Radio Announcer Joins BMCC Staff

One of the top radio personalities in the Pacific Northwest will join the Blue Mountain Community College faculty this fall, according to Wallace W. McCrae, college president.

Blaine T. Hanks, master of ceremonies of Portland's KOIN KLOCK show, a top morning program, has been appointed instructor of broadcasting at the college. In addition to teaching courses in broadcasting, Hanks will head the broadcasting department and coordinate future activities in radio and television.

A veteran of 22 years experience in radio, Hanks also is MC of a noon time variety show on KOIN radio. For the past 15 years he has also taught speech and broadcasting at Multnomah College in Portland.

His experience includes a number of CBS network news features, television weather and variety show work, television commercial announcements, public appearances and speaking engagements, and public address announcing for Multnomah Stadium and Multnomah Kennel Club.

Prior to joining KOIN in 1952, Hanks worked for Radio Station KSLM in Salem for four years and for KMCM, McMinnville, for two years.

The radio broadcasting courses Hanks will teach at BMCC are being offered here for the first time this fall. The new program will include instruction in all phases of broadcasting, including background courses in journalism and reporting. Graduates of the two-year curriculum will be awarded associate degrees and will qualify for positions as radio broadcasts.

Ullman Asks Support Of Log Amendment

Congressman Al Ullman today asked members of the House Foreign Relations Committee to "help solve the No. 1 economic problem of the Pacific Northwest" by approving the log export amendment to the Foreign Aid bill in joint House-Senate conference on the bill.

In a speech prepared for the floor of the House, Ullman urged Foreign Relations conferees to retain the Foreign Aid amendment offered by Senator Wayne Morse which would limit the export of unprocessed logs to not more than 350 million board feet per year from Western public timber. The Senate

has already approved the measure.

"Unless we act now, there will be a real economic crisis with increasing mill slowdowns and shutdowns and thousands of people being laid off," Ullman said. "We cannot allow the unlimited export of our jobs and resources to continue."

Ullman is the sponsor of legislation to extend the 350 million board feet limitation to all public timber, but expressed his "100 per cent" support for the Morse amendment as the "most immediate solution to the problem."
