**BOARDMAN** — Funeral services were held in Hermiston Saturday morning, September 14, at 10 o'clock for Lizzie R. Smith, 83, who died Wednesday at Good Shepherd hospital after a long illness. She was a resident of Boardman for 30 years, leaving here in 1944.

She was born May 2, 1885, in Minneapolis, Minn., and moved with her family as a young girl to Spokane, Wash. At the age of 21 she homesteaded 80 acres near Moses Lake, Wash., and lived alone on the homestead for eight years until 1914 when she married Paul Smith. In 1918 they moved to a farm near Boardman and resided there until 1944 when they moved to Union, Mr. Smith died in 1963. For the past years Mrs. Smith had made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Nathan Thorpe, in Hermiston.

She was a member of Greenfield Grange at Boardman and the Royal Neighbors.

## Talent-Laden Ione Defeats Dufur; Mt. Vernon Next

Talent of the Ione High school 8-man football team lost no time asserting itself when the Cardinals crushed Dufur in the opening game of the season on Ione's Memorial field Saturday afternoon, 37-14.

Looming as one of the top B teams in the state this year, the Cardinals rolled to a 25-0 half time margin over the team which last year beat them 43-7.

With the big bulge on their side, the Ione team coasted in the second half, scoring twice while Dufur also came on the scoreboard with two touchdowns.

Jim Swanson, one of the senior veterans of the Ione squad, started the season in great style for his team when he took the opening kickoff in the first quarter and ran 65 yards for a touchdown.

Other first half touchdowns came on a run by Eddie Sherman, another veteran, and on passes from Quarterback Bob Ball who tossed two touchdown pitches.

Dufur's John Rummel got his team on the scoreboard when he took an Ione kickoff for an 80-yard romp and a touchdown in the third period. In the fourth, Rummel broke away on a 51-yard run for Dufur's final touchdown.

Ball ran over to score in the third for Ione and Sherman completed the point barrage with another run in the fourth.

The Cardinals go on their road trip this Friday, meeting Mt. Vernon there. On September 27 they will play the Arlington Honkers at Ione in another non-conference game. Arlington boasts a strong team again this year, blanking Riverside High, Morrow county's other 8-man team, Friday afternoon at Boardman, 37 to 0.

The Cards start their league year on October 4 when they go to Helix.

## School Board Acts On Many Matters

(Continued from page 1) slightly from last year.

The school bus drivers workshop, conducted by Leonard Toll, proved to be very worthwhile, Daniels said, and copies of new school bus drivers' manuals were distributed.

The district's planning committee which considers long range plans for buildings will be assembled soon, probably about the first of October, the superintendent said.

Replacements are to be made on the curriculum and transportation committees with recommendations for personnel to come from the advisory committees.

Daniels said that there was some difficulty in collecting insurance from some of the students on the opening day of school under the board's new policy. Parents who had other coverage in some cases felt their children should not have to be covered by the school insurance.

He also reported that the company which has carried the district's theft insurance no longer handles this coverage. Consequently, the school buildings are temporarily not covered for theft. This insurance was taken out last year after a wave of school robberies in the district. Currently, the district is seeking information on coverage from other companies.

Daniels discussed the proposed 1 1/2% tax limitation measure that will be on the November ballot and pointed out how it will hurt the Morrow county schools.


