Expands Service On Social Security

Social security beneficiaries in Morrow county who need to report change of address or other events that affect the payment of their monthly benefits may now do so through the social security office at 1802 4th Street, (Box 1027), in La Grande, Vernon A. Welo, district manager, said today. Reports may be made by mail or personal visit.

Welo said that up to now beneficiaries were encouraged to notify the Social Security Administration about the occurrence of these events on postcard forms pre-addressed to one of six social security record centers throughout the country. Beneficiaries received the postcard forms when they initially applied for monthly benefits.

Welo said that the change in reporting methods is designed to reduce the time needed to change addresses and process other information having an effect on payment of monthly benefits. The change is prompted by the increased capacity of social security district offices to transmit the information over high speed communications circuits to record offices.

In addition to address changes, Welo said that events that affect receipt of monthly social security checks include employment, marriage or remarriage in some instances, divorce and death.

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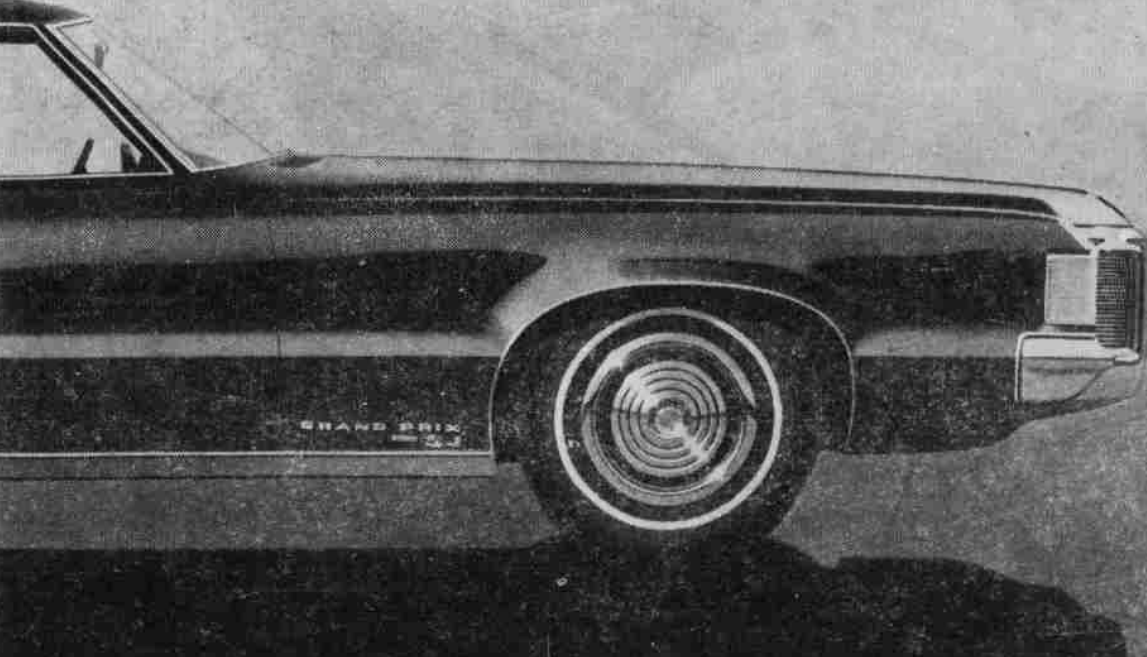
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
