ADULT EDUCATION
Blue Mountain Community College will offer five adult education classes in the South Morrow County area during the fall term. The classes, starting dates, and location are as follows:

Painting—October 3, Lexington.
High School Equivalency Prep.—October 7, Heppner.
Typing I—October 8, Heppner.
Accounting I — October 9, Heppner.

Investments—October 23, Ione. Brochures will be sent home with the elementary and high school students on Thursday, September 26.

The registration procedures have been changed this year. The registrations and organizational meeting has been eliminated. Students will enroll, pay fees, and purchase books at the first class meeting. All classes are contingent upon a membership of ten per class. Persons unable to attend the first class meeting may register by calling Heppner High school.

This year, the college is offering two full year courses: Accounting and typing-office practice. The accounting class will meet for 12 weeks each term on Wednesday nights. The typing-office practice class will meet for 10 weeks each term on Tuesday and Thursday nights. These two courses will give residents an opportunity to learn a vocational skill.
