Funeral services were held for Mrs. Lucy Shalota Wright, 87, at the Sweeney Mortuary Chapel on Sunday afternoon, September 22, at 2:00 p.m. The Rev. Dirk Rinehart of All Saints Episcopal church officiated and interment followed in Heppner Masonic cemetery, with Sweeney Mortuary in charge of the arrangements.

Mrs. Wright died at Pioneer Memorial hospital on Thursday, September 19, following a lengthy illness. She had been a resident of the Heppner community since 1928, and for several months a patient in the hospital nursing home.

Lucy High was born March 24, 1881 at Spigard, Mo. Her husband, Arthur, preceded her in death in 1928.

Surviving her are two sons, Harley Wright, Heppner, and Russell Wright of Kodiak, Alaska, and one granddaughter.

A. W. Gammell Dies After Short Illness; Services in Eugene

Funeral services were held in Eugene on Thursday afternoon, September 19, at 1:30 p.m. for Arthur William Gammell, 83, who died at Sacred Heart hospital after a short illness.

He was born in Corning, Iowa, October 15, 1882, and came to Morrow county at the age of four with his parents, Joseph and Emma Gammell. On December 25, 1907, he was united in marriage to Ida M. Job of Central Oregon.

Mr. and Mrs. Gammell farmed in the Lexington and Heppner areas for 38 years, and upon retiring in 1945, moved to Veneta, Ore., where they have since resided. Nine children were born to this union, four of whom with the widow, survive. He was a lifetime member of the Methodist church, having joined at Lexington; he was a member of the Lexington IOOF lodge for years before transferring to the Elmira lodge in 1945. He retained a constant interest in friends and relatives in this area, and had been a subscriber to the Heppner Gazette-Times for 60 years.

Besides Mrs. Gammell, he is survived by one son, Edwin W. Gammell of Eugene; three daughters, Vada DeMoss of Moro; Edna Pearson of Hoquiam, Wash.; Helen Stevens of Hardman; 20 grandchildren, 17 great-grandchildren, and one brother, Paul Gammell of Salem.

Vault interment was at Westlawn Memorial cemetery, with Poole and Larsen Funeral chapel in charge of the services.

Mrs. Dye is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Priebe, of Seattle, and two grandchildren. Also, two sisters, Mrs. Velmaleta Dore of Hennepin, Ill., and Mrs. Josephine Conway of Tigar.
