Heppner, Sherman Deadlock on Grid In Scoreless Tie

Heppner High's Mustangs and Sherman County played to a scoreless deadlock in a football game at Moro Friday night. In their second league tilt, the Mustangs failed again to get on the winning end of the scoreboard.

Heppner had many drives where touchdowns seemed inevitable, but because of numerous odd circumstances, they faltered before hitting paydirt.

They held Sherman on the Huskies' first march when Tsubota and Guy Weedman altered the running attack. After gaining one first down, the Huskies had to punt.

The Mustangs tried a new attack with Larry Pettyjohn as quarterback, John McCabe, signal caller for the first two games, came into the lineup as a running back. First series of downs for the Mustangs started on their 20, and they marched to the Huskies' 10.

Pettyjohn, running a sneak, got to the seven, then Kindle, running the sweep, was thrown for a 5-yard loss. McCabe went off tackle for four yards. On fourth down, Pettyjohn's pass to Lee Huson was knocked down. The Huskies took over on their own eight.

Sherman, relying on its running attack, failed to get a first down and punted. Heppner took over on the Huskies' 40. McCabe pegged a long pass to LaVerne VanMarter, sophomore end, in the end zone, but he couldn't hold the ball. This ended the first quarter.

The rest of the game was pretty much of a replay of the first quarter. The Mustangs cleaned up in game statistics, gaining 241 yards and posting 12 first downs to the Huskies' 138 and five first downs.

Top ground gainer for Heppner was Kindle who made 154 yards on 19 carries for an 8.5 average. His long haul for the night was 51 yards on a punt return.

Heppner traveled to Moro with two starters missing. Halfback John Hall and Bill Baker, a top receiver, who has an injured knee. At Moro, two more regular defensive standouts for the Mustangs were lost by injuries. Bill Greenup sustained a wrenched neck in the third quarter and Bruce Marquardt suffered a hurt back late in the first half. Both were taken to a hospital in The Dalles for treatment. Greenup was released after X-rays and Marquardt was released Saturday morning. Both are expected to be out of the lineup for the Burns game.

Defensive standouts against Sherman County were Lee Huson, Bill Greenup, Hal Bergstrom, Matt Murray and Greg Greenup, a freshman. Sherman's defensive standouts were Tsubota, Weedman and Cantrell.

Assistant Coach Adrian Cook said that the Mustangs are now experienced and he hopes that something will fall together by the time of the Burns game.

BISHOP JACKSON GILLIAM

Sacred Service Installs Gilliam

It was a proud day for Mr. and Mrs. Earle Gilliam as they attended the impressive consecration ceremony for their son, Jackson Gilliam, newly elected Bishop of Montana.

The couple was accompanied by their nephew, Don Gilliam, who drove with them to Helena, Mont., to attend the services in St. Helena Cathedral on September 15.

Also accompanying the family was the Gilliam's sixteen-year-old grandson, Paul, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Gilliam of Spokane.

Presiding over the service was the Most Reverend John Hines, presiding Bishop of the Episcopal church. Assisting in the rites were the Right Reverend Chandler Sterling, retired Bishop of Montana, and the Right Reverend George Murray, Bishop Co-adjutor of Alabama, who was also a classmate of Bishop Gilliam.

Nearly a thousand persons filled the cathedral to watch the ceremony consecrating the seventh Episcopal Bishop of the Diocese of Montana. The diocese includes approximately 14,000 people and 32 priests.

A former resident of Heppner, Gilliam graduated from Whitman College in Walla Walla with a bachelor of arts degree. He received degrees in Divinity and theology from the Virginia Theological Seminary at Lynchburg, Va.

Prior to his election as bishop he had served as rector of the Church of the Incarnation in Great Falls, Mont., since 1955. He is married and the father of three children.

Assessors Discuss 1-2% Limit Plan

The 1 1/2% property tax limitation measure, which will be on the ballot at the general election, received considerable attention at the convention of the Oregon Association of County Assessors at Corvallis on September 24-26.

Mrs. Joyce Ritch, Morrow county special assessor, said after attending the meeting.

The association discussed the measure extensively after hearing talks on the proposal. They did not formally take a stand in opposition but decided to advise the people to learn and be sure what they are voting on, as well as to be aware of what the 1 1/2% limitation involves.

A. F. Geldemeister, president of the Oregon United Taxpayers, Inc., sponsors of the measure, addressed the convention and fielding questions from the assessors.

Later, Doug Heider, a director of the Oregon Retail Council, discussed problems that would be encountered under the limitation when he spoke at a luncheon.

Another discussion that proved interesting, the Morrow assessor said, was that on data processing which is being looked to for the future in handling tax work.

Many speakers gave pertinent information to the assessors, including Sen. Ross Morgan, who spoke on "Cooperation for Progress"; Ken Omlid, Lane county assessor, who talked of forest land designation; Don Hattan, Clackamas county assessor, and Lee Svarverud, Douglas county assessor, who discussed qualifications for unincorporated farms on the farm land use deferral plan; and Kermit Carson, deputy director of the state finance department, who spoke on miscellaneous tax exemptions and retirement homes.

Mrs. Ritch was appointed to a livestock committee which has to do with setting values on livestock.

Pamphlets on the 1 1/2% limitation are now available at the assessor's office, she states, for those who wish to learn of its provisions.
