The Mustangs playing on their home field in front of a small crowd, were beaten by what appeared to be a much stronger Burns team. The Hilanders hit pay dirt in the second and third quarters. They also scored in the fourth, but it was nullified by a clipping penalty.

The first quarter was slow for both sides, with both squads failing to penetrate with success deep into the other's territory. Dave Glerup and Gary Peterson led the running attack behind Hilander ace Gary Shelton.

The Mustangs started on the ground with McCabe and Kindle going off tackle and on end sweeps for short gains.

The Hilanders' first score came when Dave Glerup went on an end sweep from 20 yards out. His kick was good for the PAT and the score stood 7-0 at halftime.

The start of the Burns-dominated second half gave the Hilanders' ball. They were very aggressive on their hard-hitting offensive attack led by tailback Peterson. He scored from 35 yards out on a sweep. The PAT by kicker Bob Cole was good.

The fourth quarter had the Mustangs and Hilanders playing to a standstill with the only real threat coming on a Burns off tackle run from 51 yards which was nullified on a clipping penalty.

The Mustangs played consistently the second half but failed to find a spark that would launch them on a scoring drive.

Matt Murray was a bright spot on defense, with Terry Hughes, John Hall, and John McCabe also turning in good performances for the Mustangs.

After the halftime intermission, with just a little over four minutes of the quarter played, it happened: the lights went out. Heppner had possession of the ball at the time and made a 15-yard gain.

Dean Naffziger, the Mustang coach, agreed to finish the game with car lights, but the John Day coach decided they would call it a game and head for home territory. He didn't relish playing with only car lights on a dark night.

Harley Young, manager of Columbia Basin Co-op, said later that a blown fuse caused the outage, perhaps due to two wires being blown together by the wind.

The local squad will host Condon next Monday night at six o'clock. This is a return match for the pair. Heppner defeated the Gilliam county boys on October 7.

Lone Wracks Echo For Fifth Straight; To Meet Umapine

Lone's rampant Cardinals continued to submerge the opposition when Echo fell victim to their high-powered football attack at Lone Friday afternoon. The Cards rolled to a 35-7 half-time margin and coasted to a 47-7 victory.

This was their fifth straight victory of the season and the second league triumph. Friday afternoon, October 18, they will play Umapine at Lone's Memorial Field and are favored to continue their title-bound march.

The Cards made 255 yards rushing and 118 passing against Echo's 54 rushing and 139 passing.

Eddie Sherman, one of Lone's ace senior backs, scored 27 points, and Frank Halvorsen, another 4-year veteran, tallied 14. Earl Pettyjohn completed the scoring for the winners.

The Cards won without another of their outstanding players, Jim Swanson, who still remains on the injury list with a leg injury.

Lone scored twice in the first quarter with Bob Ball passing to Sherman on a 27 yard play for one TD and Halvorsen going 70 yards on a runback for another. Sherman ran both extra points.

In the second, the Cards tallied three touchdowns, one a 96-yard run by Sherman. Echo had driven to the lone four, but the Cards held them on the one-yard line. The visitors were penalized five yards and eventually the Cards took over on their six. On the first play, Sherman broke through for the long gallop. Second score of the period was an eight yard run by Halvorsen, and the third was on a 23-yard pass play. Ball to Sherman. Halvorsen ran two extra points and Sherman one.

Echo made its lone touchdown in the second when George Koffler pitched an aerial to Jerry Roberts who went 31 yards to paydirt. The extra point was good.

In the second half of the game, which was played on a miserable cold and rainy day, lone stuck to the ground until Ball tossed a pass to Earl Pettyjohn in the fourth that covered a total of 68 yards on pass and run for their sixth TD. The extra point try failed. Final touchdown came when Sherman ran seven yards.

Umapine, Weston and Riverside now stand between the boys of Coach Gordon Meyers and the league title. The coach states that Riverside is getting stronger all the time and bowled over Weston, 46-14. Until then, Weston was considered one of the league's top teams.

Notice hereby is given that at the Boardman Park District tax base election hereby called to be held on Tuesday, the 5th day of November, 1968, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A.M. and 8:00 o'clock P.M. Pacific Standard Time, in and for the Boardman Park District, Boardman, Morrow County, Oregon, there will be submitted to the qualified voters thereof the question of establishing a tax base for the District in the sum of \$7,500.00, pursuant to Section 11, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution as amended, to be effective for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1969. The votes shall be by ballot in substantially the following form:

"MEASURE SUBMITTED TO THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE BOARDMAN PARK DISTRICT, BOARDMAN, COUNTY OF MORROW, OREGON
"MEASURE

"Shall the Boardman Park District, Boardman, Morrow County, Oregon be authorized to establish a new tax base in the amount of \$7,500 and NO/100 DOLLARS (\$7,500) pursuant to Section 11, Article XI, of the Oregon Constitution, as amended, to be effective for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1969?
"Presently there is no tax base.

"The total amount of money to be raised by the new tax base is the sum of 7,500 and NO/100 Dollars (\$7,500). In order to raise this amount of proposed tax base levy it will be necessary to levy a tax in the amount of \$1.06 per one thousand dollars of true cash value of property in the District.

"The voter shall place an (X) or a (✓) before the words 'YES,' I vote for the new tax base' or before the words 'NO, I vote against the new tax base' to signify his choice."

The election is to be held in the City of Boardman, Oregon, at the Boardman Grange Hall. The polls shall be open at the hour of 8:00 o'clock A.M. and remain open until the hour of 8:00 P.M. of the same day, at which hour the polls will be closed.
