Irrigon Council Awards Contract for Crushed Rock

IRRIGON — Routine business filled most of the regular October meeting of the City Council. Bids were opened on supplying crushed rock to the city. Only two bids were received and the contract was awarded Stan Schnell and Co. of Hermiston on its low bid for 900 cubic yards, already stockpiled in the area. The other bid from Jones-Scott Co. of Umatilla, submitted a price on delivery by an alternate bid for delivery in a shaped pile for measuring.

The audit report, prepared by Glidewell, was submitted and accepted.

Only James Keith, Sr., of the council members whose terms expire at the end of the year, has filed for reelection. Two other incumbents, Marge Shade and Vernon Stewart, have not declared themselves at this time, nor has incumbent Vestie Elgin, for the judge's seat.

At a special meeting of the Council on September 28 a resolution was adopted allowing interest on the revenue bonds for the water system to be increased to 5% instead of the previously authorized 4 1/2%.
