**Speaker Outlines Serious School Loss With Tax Measure**

Superintendent Ron Daniels, guest speaker during the program of the luncheon meeting of the Soroptimist Club last Thursday, informed members of the proposed 1 1/2% property tax limitation measure, and possible effects and limitations which would be placed on operation of the county school system, if voter approval is given in the coming election.

Daniels emphasized seriousness of the tax revenue loss, estimated to be more than \$300,000 to the county school district alone, and outlined areas where drastic budget reductions would have to be made.

Alternatives of supplementing state sales tax and higher income taxes were discussed, with the general belief that the measure, as proposed, would not provide an adequate answer to today's needed tax reform. Individual questions were discussed following the illustrated talk.

Special guest of the day was Mrs. Harry (Mary) Nicholson of San Bernardino, introduced by Mrs. Bill Johnson.
