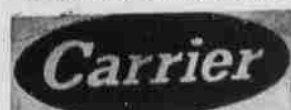

bedroom at a cost of \$550 was approved.

Particulars in a contract for a new city well were read after being drawn by City Supt. Vic Groshens, and it was turned over to the city attorney for review. Bids are expected to be called for in two or three months.

The council approved a proposal of Fire Chief Forrest Burkenbine for the fire department to inspect buildings in Heppner as one of the improvements requested by the Oregon Insurance Rating Bureau. The inspection is expected to be confined principally to business buildings.

False arrest insurance was discussed, and Police Chief Glenn Kolkhorst gave pros and cons on the matter. A company had offered the insurance to the city at a low premium. Before any action is taken, the city will check with the insurance commissioner on whether the firm is licensed in the state of Oregon.

Under a policy approved at the meeting, matters to be placed on the agenda for council consideration must be in the hands of the recorder a week prior to a regular meeting. This is to permit councilmen a chance to think on the matters and problems in advance without being forced to act on them "cold." It was agreed that this will not prevent incidental matters from coming before the council nor prevent appearance of anyone with business to present.
