Mann Taking Part In Resource Meets

Rep. Irvin Mann of Stanfield is appearing today (Thursday) on a 4-member legislative panel before the 20th annual meeting of the Oregon Association of Soil and Water Conservation districts in Salem.
 He will also represent Oregon on the Human Resources and Agriculture committee of the Western Conference of the Council of State Governments in Los Angeles November 18-20.
 At Salem, Mann will outline water legislation that will be proposed to the legislature by Gov. Tom McCall and his state agencies. Mann will also detail his own plan for state financing of water developments and enabling the creation of multiple purpose water control districts.
 Also on the panel will be Sen. L. W. Newby, Medford; Rep. Joe Rogers, Independence; and Speaker-elect Rep. Robert Smith, Burns.
 A highlight of the Los Angeles conference will be an inspection of the rehabilitation of the Watts area which was riot-torn in 1968.
