## Monument Soldier In Vietnam Action

CAMP ENARI, Vietnam — The orders, "On Line" and "Move Out," sounded and the 4th Infantry Division soldiers began a push through the misty first-light in the jungles surrounding Pleiku.

Sp5 Howard W. Dahill and thousands of other men from the division base camp were engaged in a "Sweep". Normally a survey party chief, but in this operation an infantryman, Sp5 Dahill helped form a cordon 10 to 15 kilometers distant from Camp Enari. The ring of troops was tightened by the soldiers walking toward the camp to flush out enemy units or uncover new bunkers or rocket sites. By dusk the part-time infantrymen were back inside the base camp after crossing monsoon-swollen streams and rice paddies and hacking through thick bamboo in a search for elusive "Charlie."

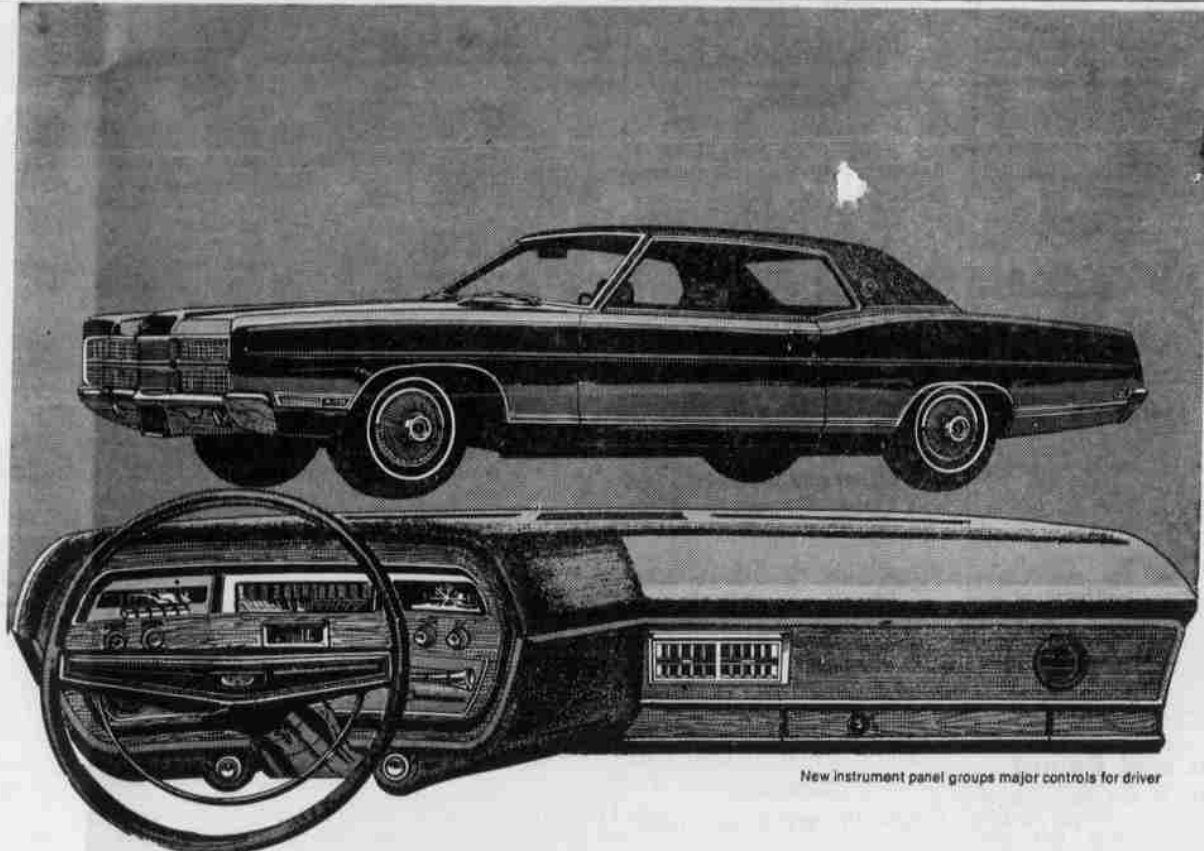
