## Ullman Introduces Bill Proposing Election Reforms

Congressman Al Ullman recently introduced a major election reform bill to establish a national presidential primary, amend the constitution to abolish the electoral college, and to elect the president and the vice president by direct popular vote.

Ullman said his proposal would "prevent elections from being thrown into the House of Representatives," and that it would "bring the electoral process closer to the people."

"While there probably will be no Congressional action on the bill this year, I intend to reintroduce similar legislation early in the next session of Congress, and am hopeful that these reforms can be made in time for the 1972 presidential elections."

Ullman's bill, the "National Presidential Elections Act," would, (1) provide for a national primary to nominate presidential candidates, with qualifying standards for political parties and candidates to assure widespread support before they can get on the national primary election ballot; (2) abolish the electoral college and provide for the election of the President and Vice President by direct popular vote; (3) establish a national presidential elections commission to administer the presidential primary election, and (4) allow the states to administer candidate, party, and voter qualification procedures. The provisions of the legislation cover only presidential elections and would not affect procedures for other races.

Ullman's bill is unique in requiring a run-off if no candidate receives over 50% of the vote in the general election. A run-off between the two candidates with the highest vote would be held two weeks after the general election in November. "I think it particularly important that we assure that no president be elected without a majority vote," Ullman said.

To participate in the national primary, a political party would have to qualify in at least three-fourths of the states by having received 25% or more of the vote in the previous presidential election or by filing petitions with signatures of at least 5% of the qualified voters in those respective states.

Candidates for the presidential primary election would qualify by filing petitions with signatures of at least 2% of the national electorate and must run under the banner of one of the qualified political parties.

The presidential primary election would be held during the first week of September, the general election the first Tuesday in November and any possible runoff the third Tuesday in November.
