IRRIGON—Water system for the City of Irrigon is well on its way in becoming a reality. Call for bids will soon be made for construction of a distribution system, pumping station, and storage tanks for the water system.

Mayor Wilson met recently with Barry Barnes, engineer for the project, from Cornell, Howard, Hayes & Merryfield, of Seattle, to review facility changes made necessary by results of tests on the completed well.

Bid opening has been set for Tuesday, February 25 at 5 p.m., when a special meeting will be called for that purpose. The tentative date for awarding contracts in March 5. The project is scheduled for completion in June of this year.

## WATER FACTS

IRRIGATION is no longer a "fad" or something for the experimental farmer. Irrigation has earned a place in the future of farming along with mechanized equipment and other modern aids to insure better crops and take the risk out of farming.
