

Mustangs Trip Enterprise With 90-76 Victory

It was cold (minus-20 degrees) in Enterprise last Friday night, but not cold enough to stop the Mustangs basketball team. The Heppner high schoolers were victorious over a fast-breaking Enterprise club by a phenomenal score of 90-76, with Coach Bob Clough's basketesters sharpshooting an incredible 48% from the field and 75% from the charity stripe.

Heppner's point total was one of the highest—if not the highest—that a Mustang team has ever scored.

Jan O'Donnell and John McCabe led the Horsemen in the scoring category with 26 and 25 counters respectively.

The Mustangs led at all breaks with the biggest margin coming at the final buzzer. HIS also led in the rebounding department with 41 to the Savages' 27.

Ione Claims 2 Wins; Holds Undefeated Record

Heavy artillery of the Ione High basketball team zeroed in on two league opponents in the basketball wars of the Morrow-Umatilla B league over the week-end, and the Cardinals emerged with their victory banner unattested.

They crushed Umapine there Friday night, 80-53, and despite a cold start against Umatilla at Ione Saturday night, shifted gears and rolled over the Vikings, 70 to 54.

Two more league games face the Cardinals this week-end. They will travel to Echo Friday night and then play at home Saturday night against Helix.

Frank Halvorsen almost equalled Umapine's entire output by himself when he burned the net with 46 points, 40 of them on 30 field goals. His team made 34 of 59 attempts from the floor, but Frank's accuracy was far above the rest of the team with 20 of 27. Umapine made only 21 of 62 tries.

The Chiefs kept it a fairly close game at the start, trailing only 14-12 at the end of the first quarter, but by halftime the Cards were going away at 34-23. In the third, Halvorsen, with 25 points in the single period, led a blazing 29-point spree for the winners.

Halvorsen led in rebounds, getting 12 of 33 picked by his team. Eddie Sherman led in assists with five.

Against Umatilla, the Cardinals went 3½ minutes without

Glass Backboards Installed at Ione

Glass backboards have been installed in the Ione High School gymnasium. The Ione Lion's club, headed by Herb Ekstrom, spearheaded the fund-raising which was aided by contributions of community-spirited individuals and the IHS Student Body. Total cost of the boards was approximately \$550, all of which was paid for by private fund-raising and a student body contribution of \$100.

The new glass backboards replace old metal backboards which were installed at the time the gym was built. Basketball Coach Gene Dockter feels that the glass backboards will give the Ione team a more equal chance, as most of the other schools have them. He states that "glass backboards cause a different bounce and force a change in shooting by the players."

The Cards were cold by streaks and had a poor third quarter, going four minutes without a bucket, but Ione had gained an 8-point halftime edge, and they moved well in front in the late stages of the game. Their field goal average was down from the night before as they made only 24 of 79. Umatilla hit 21 of 70. Halvorsen again was game high, with 27, but he didn't put on the show that he did the night before.

Jim Swanson, still battling the leg injury, was back, and started to gain momentum against Umatilla with 14. Sherman led in field goals in the game and was second high with 21 points.
