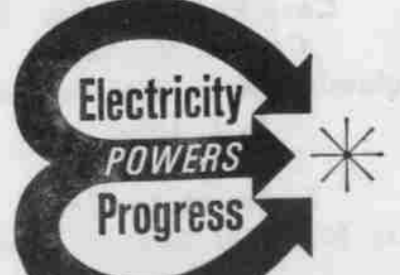

Hearing Called On Grain Fees

Increases in fees charged by the Oregon Department of Agriculture for inspection, grading and weighing of grain was discussed at a hearing called by the Department on Wednesday, January 22, in Portland. Assistant Director of Agriculture E. A. Bamford said an increase in fees is necessary to meet the rising costs of performing these services. He noted that two factors have contributed to financial loss in operation of the department's grain division: The rising cost of performing these services, plus the reduction in volume of grain movement in the state. Bamford said that during the month of November, 1968, fees received for performing inspection, grading and weighing services were \$21,342 less than the month's cost of operation. In the 11-month period of 1968 through November fees were \$169,736 below actual cost of the inspection services. Until 1968 the fees had carried the cost of those services performed by the grain division despite the increase in actual costs of inspections, grading and weighing, because of the huge volume of grain moving in the state. The department has not increased these fees since 1965. Copies of the proposed revisions in the fee schedule are available at the department's grain division in Portland. Persons unable to attend the hearing may submit evidence and testimony orally or in writing to the department prior to the hearing. This is to be given to the Grain Division, Oregon Department of Agriculture, 605 S. E. Ninth Avenue, Portland, Oregon 97214, prior to or at the time of the hearing.
