Donna Pointer Wins Annual High School Homemaking Award

Donna K. Pointer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Pointer, Lexington, has been named 1969 Betty Crocker Homemaking of Tomorrow for Heppner high school, after achieving the highest score in a homemaking knowledge and attitude test which she took along with other senior class girls in her school December 3, it has been announced. Donna will be awarded a special Betty Crocker silver charm in a special presentation by her instructor, Mrs. Ann Hilderbrand. Also, her paper has been entered with those of other school winners in the state in competition for the title, State Homemaking of Tomorrow. The winner of this honor will be granted a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the annual program, and her school will be awarded a complete set of Encyclopaedia Britannica. State runners-up will be granted \$500 scholarships.

The annual search for the Homemaking of Tomorrow was started in 1954-55 to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. It marked its 15th anniversary this year with a record enrollment of 630,564 senior girls in 15,116 of the nation's schools. Total enrollment since the program started exceeds 6 million and more than \$1.5 million has been granted in scholarships.
