The annual congregational meeting of the Boardman Community church was held Tuesday of last week at the church, starting with potluck supper at 6:30.

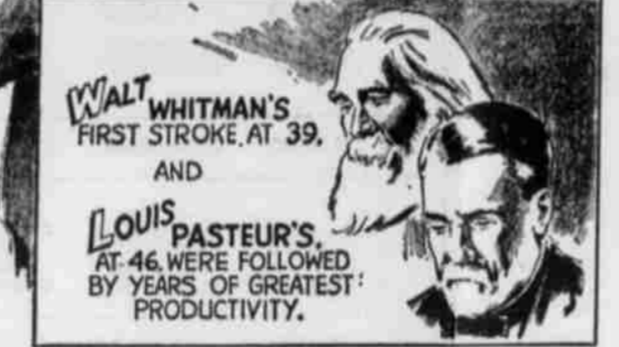

Demonstrations Set On Abundant Foods

A demonstration of abundant foods available to low income persons will be the main feature of a combined Morrow-Gilliam-Wheeler counties public welfare commission meeting to be held at the court house in Condon at 2:30 p.m., March 5. The public is invited. The extension Service will discuss its role in helping abundant food recipients manage on a limited food budget. New foods and recipes will be shown. Food samples will be available for testing.

There are 252 people in Morrow, Gilliam and Wheeler counties participating in the abundant food program, according to Lowell Chally, administrator of the tri-county welfare commission. These foods make up an important part of their diet.

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
