**Sara Miller Named Soroptimist Youth Citizenship Winner**

Miss Sara Miller, Heppner High school senior, has been announced as local winner of the 1969 Soroptimist Youth Citizenship Awards contest. Her winning essay is now entered in competition with others in District No. 2 of the Northwestern Region of Soroptimist Clubs, with the district winner to advance to regional competition.

The program, sponsored nationally by Soroptimist Foundations, recognizes youth achievement in the family, in the community, and in the world. The program recently received its sixth consecutive annual George Washington Honor Medal from Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge.

Local judges of this year's entries in the contest report the essays were of outstanding quality. There were 13 entrants, and all impressed the selection committee with their thought-provoking work.

Sara, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Miller of Heppner, will receive a cash award from the Heppner Soroptimist club, and will be eligible for further award in the district. A total of 17 regional awards of \$1,000 each will be announced during the second week in April. Each regional winner will then compete for a finalist award of \$1,500. In all, it is estimated that a total of \$75,000 will be awarded to approximately 1,500 high school seniors. These Awards of Merit may be used by the recipients in ways to best further the students' aim to achieve their goals in education and specialized study.

Following her graduation from Heppner High school where she has been an outstanding honor student, Sara plans to enroll at the University of Oregon and study toward a major in the field of speech therapy.

**Church Women Plan Annual Easter Party**

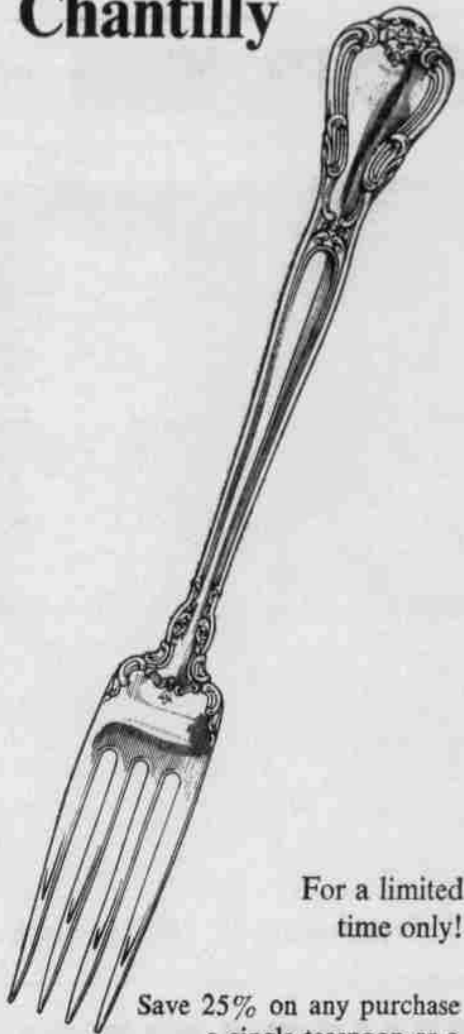
Chairmen for the annual Easter Monday Card Party were named at the last meeting of ECW held at All Saints' Episcopal church on Sunday following regular morning services.
