## Vale Takes Third With 55-47 Win Over Prospectors

After losing out for the championship with the overtime defeat by Heppner at La Grande Friday night, 49 to 47, the sparkling Vale Vikings came back to take third place in the district 7 A-2 basketball tournament by defeating Grant Union, 55-47, Saturday night.

The Prospectors were stone cold in the first quarter and fell far behind the Viks, 23 to 5. However, Grant Union sharpened up in the second stanza and outpointed the winners, 14 to 10, to go into intermission trailing, 33-19.  
Gaining momentum, the Prospectors came to within six points by the end of the third period, 43-37, but couldn't overcome the speedy team from Malheur county.

Steve Kenison tallied 28 points for Vale, coming on the heels of his 24 point night against Heppner on Friday, making 52 for the tourney.

In the second game of the opening round Friday night, Grant Union took command in the first half and held a 31 to 24 lead over Wah-tonka by half-time.  
But the Prospectors hit a cold spot in the third quarter. Wah-tonka, led by Greg Bliss and Bruce Wilkes, tallied eight straight points at the start of the period and took the lead, 32 to 31. Although it was a saw-saw battle from that point, Wah-tonka never bowed and moved to the eventual three point victory.

Bliss piled up 25 points for the winners, while Dave Dieker led Grant Union with 17.

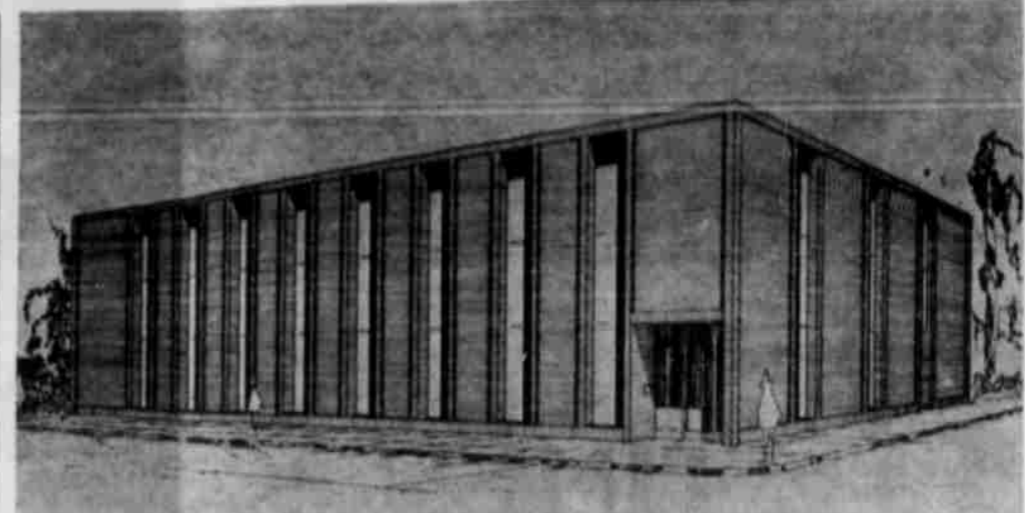

## Staff Applicants Needed for 4-H Counsel Work

Applications are now in the county Extension office for State Summer School counselors and State Fair student staff.  
College age counselors are needed to live with and supervise the 13-17 year old 4-H delegates. Counselors must have completed one year of college; 4-H and counseling experience are desirable but not essential. Counselors will be paid \$60.00 minus deductions, and room and board are furnished.

Anyone interested is invited to contact the county office for more details and application forms. Applications are due in Corvallis by April 15.

The State Fair student staff applicants must have completed one year of college. They will be employed at various duties in dormitory, exhibit buildings, horse show, livestock, dog shows and such. Uniforms are furnished to this staff. Student staff will be paid \$12.00 per day minus deductions. Room and meals are provided. Applications are due June 15.

The county Extension office also has a supply of "Father of the Year" forms for the convenience of any youth group that wishes to make a nomination for this honor. Four-H groups are encouraged to enter deserving fathers in this contest.

### Four-H Summer School

Applications for State 4-H Summer School will be mailed out from Corvallis this month to all 4-H club members 12 years old or over who are enrolled. Application mailings will be made from ADP computer listings. Any 4-H member who does not receive the application by March 25 should call the Extension office. Members must have the application, completed with leader recommendations, returned to the county Extension office by April 15.

## Telephone Office Moved On Monday To New Site

Pacific Northwest Bell's business office and its Eastern Oregon district office moved to a new address in Pendleton Monday, March 10.

The address is 202 S. E. Dorion Avenue, the location of a brand new, brown-brick, two-story office building. The structure was built for PNB on a lease basis by the Greenleaf Company of Portland.

There are 35 PNB men and women working in the building designed by Wesley Korman, Pendleton architect, according to Dale Slusher, phone company manager.

Slusher and the 13 women employees in the business office handle service contacts and accounts for customers in Heppner, Athena-Weston, Echo, Pendleton, Hermiston, Ione, Lexington, Milton-Freewater, Stanfield and Umatilla. The company's business office phone number will not change.

### Serve Eastern Area

Other employees working in the building handle staff operations for the company traffic, commercial plant and engineering activities east of the Cascades in Oregon.

Entrance to the building is at the corner of S. E. 2nd and Dorion. A receptionist-cashier is located in the foyer portion inside the entrance. To the left is the business office area for service representatives, order typists, business office supervisor and Slusher. Also on the first floor is a training room, lounge, rest-rooms and telephone equipment space.

The second floor provides office space for the district managers and their staffs, a conference room, a lounge and rest-rooms.

### Solar Glass Used

Exterior of the structure is light brown brick. Solar glass tinted windows are encased in amodized bronze. Much of the interior is exposed brick, accented by vinyl wall covering and oak plank.

The building is air conditioned. Off street parking is provided for telephone company vehicles.

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## Bids Considered For City Pumping

IRRIGON—Bids were opened at 5 p.m. February 25, on installation of a water distribution system for the City of Irrigon, including tank and pumping facilities.

The apparent low bidder among the six submitting bids was Richard T. Robertson of Vancouver, whose bid of \$66,003 for the basic project was \$400 over the engineer's estimate. Since there were many unit prices and alternate items involved it will be several days before the engineers can fully evaluate the bid proposals and make their recommendations to the City for award of contract.

The high bid of \$78,780 was submitted by E. W. Eldridge, Inc., of Sandy.
