

Speakers Present Ideas For City Development

BOARDMAN—Members of the Boardman City Council held a no-host luncheon at the Dodge City restaurant Monday noon, March 10, along with local business men and women, to hear Delmar B. Putnam and Robert A. Gaynor, loan officers of the Small Business Administration of Portland, discuss a local development program. There were 32 present.

Mayor Dewey West, master of ceremonies, introduced M.D. Van Valkenburgh, The Dalles attorney, who has worked with local people for many years assisting them in the relocation of the town. West stated that without him, he doubts if the city would ever have gotten moved.

Van Valkenburgh introduced Putnam, who spoke on the program, stating that 95% of the businesses are considered small. He said to develop a local corporation takes nothing more than a group of people for the purpose of industrial, commercial and recreational facilities. Ten percent of the cost in towns of under 5000 population must be furnished. He recommended a first mortgage under private financing, with the SBA taking a second mortgage.

In Gaynor's talk he stated it would take 25 stockholders to form a local development corporation. He said one of the purposes of the local corporation is to stop the young people from leaving small towns for the cities, and to create jobs for them at home.

Mayor West asked for a showing of hands about the reformation of a Chamber of Commerce, and appointed Wally Hendrix and Carl Wicklander as a nominating committee to interview possible officers for an organization.

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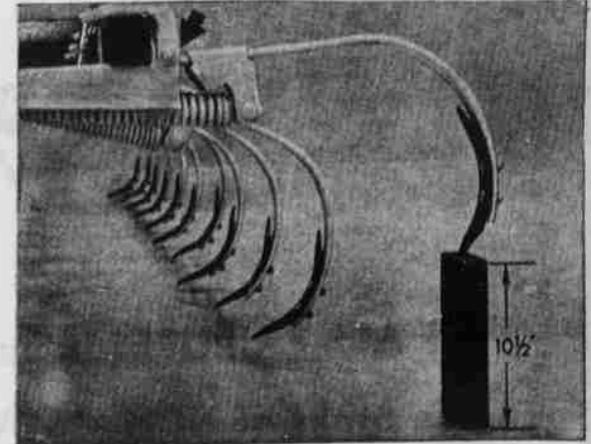
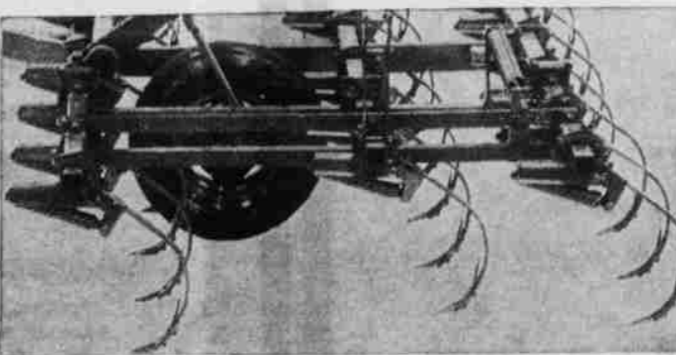
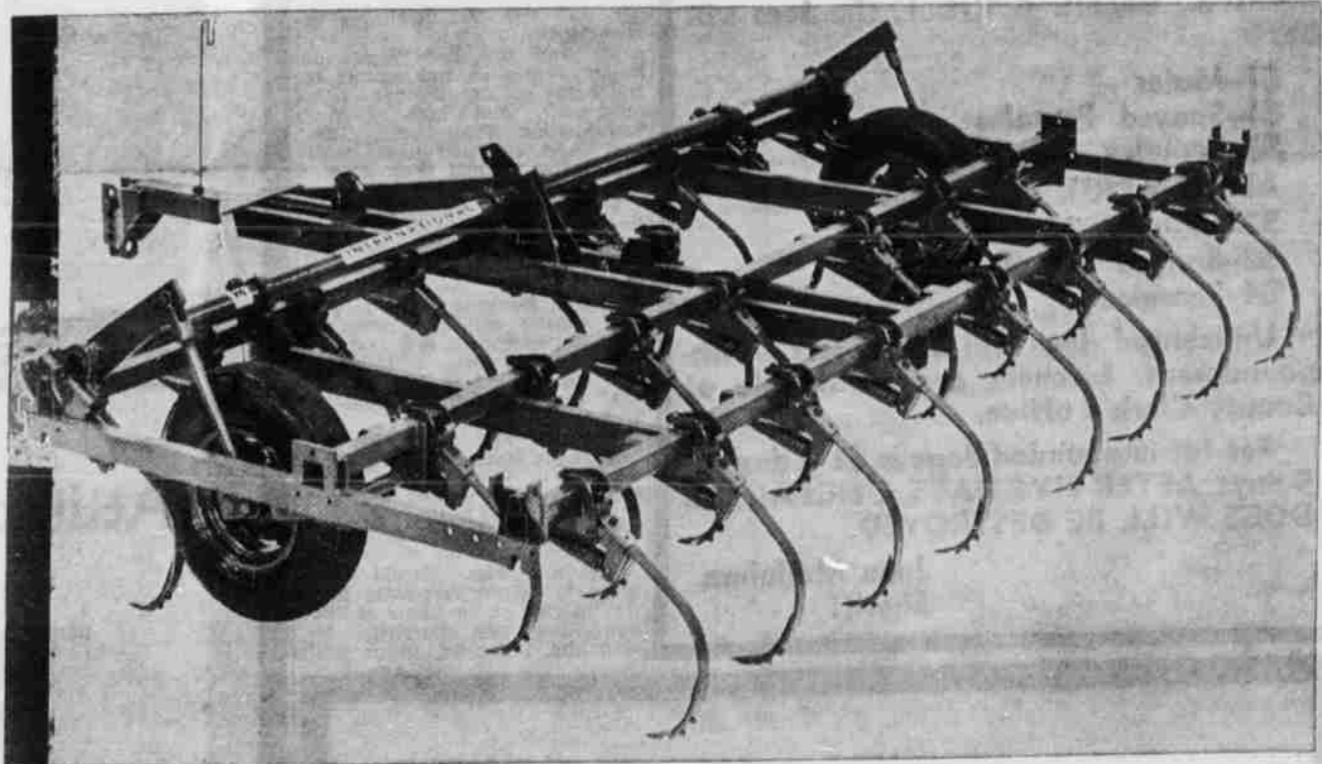
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
