Miss Pat Cassidy, Mrs. Bob Bergstrom and Mrs. Curtis Culp are preparing a booklet containing businesses, churches, clubs and organizations, schools, music teachers, ambulances and hospital phone numbers and other services to be found in Heppner. Miss Lincoecum will demonstrate how to make the basic knots and show members how to make a sampler.
