

Damage To Power Lines Caused by Uprooted Tree

IONE — About 6:15 Saturday evening a large locust tree in the Darrel James yard was uprooted by high wind. It fell across the street, hitting the roof of the Frederick Martin home, and blocking off the south end of the street.

As the tree fell, it hit the electric light and telephone wires, cutting off all services in that end of town, and also pulled the light pole over, leaving it stand at a 45-degree angle. As the pole leaned, it pulled all the wires and meter box off the front of the Hamlett home.

A broken wire was left dangling out of the trees in their front yard. About an hour later the light pole fell to the ground raising the wire out of danger.

Around 8:00 p.m. Donald Hecker came in with his tree cutting equipment and with the help of Clifford Aldrich, they soon cleared a passage way for the Columbia Basin crew to get their equipment through that was needed to repair the damage. Shortly after midnight the service was restored.

Early Sunday morning the telephone crew repaired their lines, and by mid-afternoon the mess from the trees was cleared and all that remained was the mangled corner of Martin's roof and damaged fence, and the broken sidewalk and fence at the James home.
