Extension Units Offer Lesson on Economical Preparation of Meats

Home Extension units in Morrow and Umatilla counties will all study the lesson "Vary Meals with Variety and Less Expensive Meats" at their April unit meetings, reports Molly Saul, Extension Home Economist for the two-county area.

The lesson will emphasize the importance of meat in the diet, and will bring out ways to incorporate meat inexpensively in family meals. Demonstrations will be given on interesting ways to prepare stew, and how to cook organ meats such as tongue, liver, heart, and kidney. The nutritive value of the organ and less expensive meat cuts will be discussed. Free Oregon State University and United States Department of Agriculture bulletins will be distributed. Recipes in these publications may also be used for game meats such as venison and elk.

Any homemaker who is interested in saving the meat dollar is invited to attend a unit meeting in her area in April. Complete information concerning meetings in the two-county area may be obtained by telephoning or writing the county Extension offices.
