Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in Blue Mountain Area Education District, of Umatilla and Morrow Counties, State of Oregon, from 8:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M. on April 15, 1969 at the Polling Places listed below in said school district, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year 1969-70 over the amount limited by section 11, Article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reasons for increasing such levy are: the funds are needed to meet the operating expenses of Blue Mountain Community College. The district has no tax base.
