## Caution Advised Using Pesticides

Weed killers and pesticides now available for home use should be handled with extreme caution.

This warning was issued today by Dr. Edward Press, state health officer.

"Weekend gardeners and housewives must recognize that some of the newer items on the market, used in poisoning plants or insects, could severely endanger human health unless used with utmost care," Press said.

He advised that rubber gloves be worn when spraying herbicides or pesticides, even when these compounds are packaged in aerosol cans.

Droplets of the spray should never be allowed to come into contact with the mouth or eyes, Press emphasized.

"Parents of small children must be sure to keep these hazardous substances well out of reach—preferably stored under lock and key," said the health officer.

He pointed out that last year Oregon had more than 100 known cases of poisonings by herbicides and pesticides.
