Madison Describes New Zealand Tour

Using colored pictures to illustrate his talk, Gaylord Madison, Butter Creek rancher, described New Zealand as a land where "all the water is deep blue" when he told the Chamber of Commerce April 7 of his recent trip to that country and Australia.

The well-known rancher was particularly interested in sheep ranches. He found that most of their sheep are Romneys crossed with Dorsets and there are 63,000,000 head of breeding ewes on the two islands of New Zealand.

53 Applications Made

"Some 53 applications have been received by the Soil Conservation Service in Oregon. Only 12 watershed work plans have been completed, with watershed planning funds available to the Soil Conservation Service for fiscal year 1969 having been reduced.

"Federal expenditure economizing has critically cut the watershed operation funds of the Soil Conservation Service, resulting in no new construction contracts being awarded this fiscal year to Oregon. There is approximately \$10 million of construction planned for installation in Oregon during the next three years.

"At the same time we are experiencing more rather than less demand for means to conquer the problems of testing, development and culture in the critical erosion areas and difficult sites.

Oregon's Need Great

"Oregon is in desperate need of a higher level of financial support for Plant Materials Centers, soil surveys on our prized forest land, watershed planning activities and investigations, and watershed construction activities.

Ullman Testimony Calls for Forest Policy Changes

Congressman Al Ullman has called for a "bold new approach" to the problems of national forest management and for financing improved forestry techniques.

In testimony before the House Banking and Currency Committee, Ullman said that the federal portion of timber sale receipts should be reinvested in programs to stimulate greater production of timber. The Committee is conducting public hearings into the problem of high lumber prices and timber supply shortages. Ullman told them the present critical shortage of timber and the resulting wide fluctuation in prices could be avoided in the future without jeopardizing sustained yield management. He said present policies are "outmoded" and "obsolete."

In addition to more intensive management, he called for the adoption of a triggering device whereby the availability of timber would be increased by the Forest Service when lumber price increases exceed increases in the national price index of manufactured goods.

Tighter log export restrictions and possible amendment of the Jones Act limiting intercoastal shipping to U. S. registered vessels were also cited by Ullman as a part of the solution to the domestic log shortage.

Ullman said he would oppose any change that threatened the policy of sustained yield, but that there are "more sensible means to achieve that goal than those we are now using." He said the even-flow concept now practiced by the Forest Service has made us "custodians of a static resource."

Speaker Opposes Grazing Fee Hike

Oregon House Speaker Robert F. Smith said recently the legislature has urged the Secretaries of Agriculture and Interior to refrain from implementing proposed grazing fee increases.

Smith said the legislature approved a measure asking that the proposed increases in fees be reconsidered. Copies of the measure were sent to members of Oregon's Congressional delegation.

Smith, who represents Harney and Malheur counties, said that the fee increase, if implemented, would amount to "cut off your nose to spite your face" economic policies.

He said the proposed fee hikes were ordered by former Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman and former Interior Secretary Stewart Udall, without sufficient study as to their impact on the livestock industry.

Smith said that implementation of the new fee schedule "will run many livestock ranchers out of business, thereby leaving many thousands of acres of federal grazing lands lying dormant. This is certainly short-sighted fiscal reasoning."

He said he was also concerned because the value of grazing permits was overlooked in the proposed action.

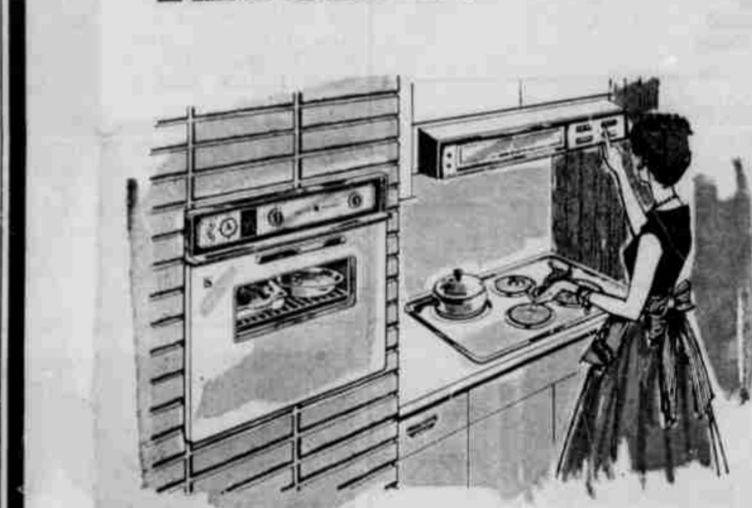
