Astronomy Program, Slide Show Offered For Church Service

Two programs which should be of special interest to the community according to H. E. Preston, pastor of the local Seventh-day Adventist church, will be presented during the coming week-end services at the church, which is located at 560 North Minor.

Kerr Gives Advice On Weed Sprays

Wheat growers spraying annual weeds in their winter wheat have several choices when selecting chemicals this spring, says Harold Kerr, county extension agent.

Applications two weeks ago of a mixture of Bromoxynil (Buctril) and MCPA look real good on wheat sprayed in the two to three tiller stage. This chemical can be applied at an earlier stage of growth than 2,4-D can safely be used. Growers should wait until wheat is in the 4-5 tiller stage before using 2,4-D.

Recommended rates of Bromoxynil and MCPA are three-eighths pound of each chemical or 1½ pints of material. This material is on the market under the trade names of Bromate or Bromini plus.

Application of 2,4-D should be at the rate of three-fourths pound per acre. Another chemical applied in the fall as a pre-emergent, that has shown good results on seedling grasses and broadleaf weeds is linuron.
