State Water Needs Report Planned for Public Meeting

Governor Tom McCall announces that the public presentation of the Oregon Ultimate Needs Water Study will be made Wednesday, May 7, at 2:00 p.m., in the Fine Arts auditorium at Willamette University.
 The presentation will be made by the governor and the State Water Resources board which has conducted the study during the past four years to determine whether or not Oregon has a surplus of water to meet its future requirements. Oregon is the first Northwest state to complete such a far-reaching study of water needs, McCall said.
 The study, authorized by the 1965 legislature, has been conducted by the Water Resources board to identify Oregon's ultimate or long-range water requirements for all beneficial uses including municipal, irrigation, power development, industry, recreation, wildlife and fish life uses, water quality and navigation.
 Both houses of the Oregon legislature will recess for the afternoon presentation.

Sheep Foot Rot Research Slated

A \$34,000 research budget has been set at Oregon State University for seeking a preventive for foot rot and other foot diseases of the Oregon sheep population. The announcement was made to the Oregon Sheep Growers Association by Doug Chambers, Marion county sheep grower and member of the OSU Advisory Council. Chambers reported to the Sheep Growers at an executive meeting of the Sheep Growers Association in Corvallis, April 18.
 Chambers said foot rot has been a serious problem for many years in Western Oregon in particular and that a preventive would be of great value to the sheep industry.
 Steve Eymann, Clackamas County, chairman of legislative committee for the Oregon Sheep Growers, reported on bills of interest to sheepmen. Named as the most important of the state legislation was the field burning bills now being considered. Eymann said curtailment of field burning, especially on rye grass fields, would seriously harm the sheep growers of western Oregon. Some 60,000 lambs are winter grazed on rye grass fields in the Willamette Valley. Obviously, Eymann said, anything that curtails the growing of grass in the valley would have an adverse affect on the western Oregon sheep business.

Pesticide Storage Risky, Says Agent

This cardinal rule of pesticide accident prevention is of special significance in the spring when farmers and their wives increase their purchases of pesticides for farm, home, and garden use, notes Harold Kerr, county extension agent.
 Getting the "giant economy size" will save money when it comes to soap and toothpaste. You can always store these commodities for future use. Storage of leftover pesticides is a more risky proposition. Each year hundreds of children are hospitalized after getting into pesticides their parents thought were safely stored away.
 Disposal of leftover pesticides is also risky if you don't follow proper procedures. Improper disposal can result in crop losses, the poisoning of livestock, illegal residues, or pollution of your water system.
 Kerr recommends avoiding pesticide "storage" and "disposal" hazards by purchasing only as much pesticide as you need to solve the immediate problem at hand.
