State Forestry Plants Seedlings

Reforestation Assistant Jack Wanek of the State Forestry Department estimates that about 90 percent of planned reforestation work on state land will be accomplished this year in spite of the severe winter which hampered efforts.

Heavy snows brought reforestation to a halt in western Oregon, Wanek reports, and eastern Oregon planting has not started yet.

About 14,000 acres will have been reforested by the time this year's work is complete. This will break down to about 9,000 acres planted and 5,000 acres seeded. Wanek reports about 4,354,000 trees involved and 2,500 pounds of seed.

Most of the work has taken place in northwest Oregon where 6,800 acres were planted with 3,344,000 seedlings and 4,885 acres were seeded with 2,443 pounds of seed.

Eastern Oregon has been delayed a month in its planting efforts. Wanek says, but he estimates 120 acres will be planted with about 60,000 seedlings there soon.

State Vets' Loans Set New Record

The Oregon veterans' farm and home loan program continues to set new records in volume of applications and loan closures, H. C. Saalfeld, director of veterans' affairs, reports.

The state veterans' department received 937 loan applications in March for the highest month on record. This compares with 698 for February and 439 for March, 1968. The previous high month was 924 in May, 1957.

In the quarter just ended, 1,617 veterans borrowed \$23,645,650 for the highest quarter in dollar volume on record. This was a 32 percent gain over the October-December quarter, and a 62 percent increase above the first quarter of 1968.

Loans went to 588 veterans in March for \$8,540,200, the third highest number and dollar volume on record. February loans went to 484 veterans for \$7,046,850. A year ago March 353 veterans borrowed \$4,872,350.

About 40 percent of the department's loan applications are coming from post-Korean veterans made eligible by voters in November general election.


