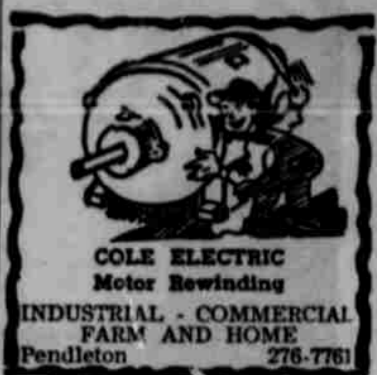
Granddaughter Born
