Forest Service \$7 Annual Permit Sale Plan Told
 The \$7 annual permit (Golden Eagle Passport) to recreation sites will not be sold in National Forest campgrounds in Oregon and Washington this season.
 The annual permit will be on sale at Forest Service offices but not at campgrounds, said Regional Forester Charles A. Connaughton.
 The \$1 daily permits will be available at campgrounds on a "do it yourself" basis, but not the \$7 annual permit. Those who want the annual permit (Golden Eagle Passport) should purchase it before they go to the charge areas, just as they would hunting and fishing licenses.
 About 20 percent of the Pacific Northwest Region's 1200 campgrounds will be under the charge system this summer, and use of the annual permit or \$1 daily ticket will be required at those sites.
 The Golden Eagle Passport can also be used at other federal recreation areas such as National Parks.
 There are numerous places in Oregon and Washington where it can be purchased prior to going camping. Forest Service outlets include the Regional Office in the Multnomah Building in Portland, all Forest Supervisor's offices and District Ranger offices, including the Heppner district, and the Visitor Information Center at Cape Perpetua on the Oregon coast.

Council Adopts Irrigon Budgets

 IRRIGON—The budget for the City of Irrigon for fiscal year 1969-1970 was adopted as approved by the budget committee, when the City Council met Tuesday night. The budget calls for a total expenditure of \$18,225 with \$1,592 taxes to be levied, which is within the 6% limitation and no election will be held.
 A supplemental budget for the current fiscal year covering additional financing received for the water system in the amount of \$14,600 was also adopted.
 It was noted that some material had been delivered for the water system and the contractor, A. V. DeBlasio, Construction Co. of Yakima, Wash., is moving in equipment to do the job.
 Other business before the Council included signing a contract with Glidewell, whose proposal to audit the books was approved.
 The degree of Bachelor of Rhymes was given to 26 youngsters from North Morrow county, who have been attending A. C. Houghton Kindergarten and completed their course of study, on Friday. They received their diplomas from Principal Michael Tolar, after a short program of rhymes, songs and recitations. A picnic followed with ice cream furnished by the Kindergarten Association.

Water Supply Termed Excellent

Excellent water supplies are in prospect for water users this spring and summer in Gilliam, Umatilla and Morrow counties according to a report released today by the Soil Conservation Service, Portland.
 Rapid melt of mountain snow occurred early in April due to warm temperatures. Snow remains at only the higher elevation snow courses such as Tollgate and Lucky Strike. However, the snowpack is still 80 percent of normal for this time of year.
 Generous amounts of rain were received in the area during April. The U. S. Weather Bureau reported 139 percent of normal rainfall.
 Principal reservoirs are now full or nearly full. Cold Springs contains 49,700 acre feet while McKay reservoir is holding 70,800 a.f.
 Streamflow was excellent during April according to the U. S. Geological Survey. The Umatilla near Pendleton produced 135,700 a.f. during the month. This is 180 percent of average.
