**Garment Care Told By Extension Agent**

They may be "mini" tags but the pack "maxi" information. So look to the hangtags on the garments or fabrics you buy.

Until manufacturers start putting permanent sew-in labels in our clothing, the hangtag tied or pinned to your new clothing purchases is required reading, says Mary Speckhart, extension agent in Umatilla and Morrow counties.

Manufacturers are required to let shoppers know, by way of hangtags or label, what fiber or fibers are in the garment; how much of each fiber is present; what manufacturer made the garment; and, if imported, what country the garment or fabric came from.

Should you dry clean or wash your new purchase? Iron or drip dry it? Use a chlorine bleach or not?

"Read the hangtag," advises Miss Speckhart. "Care instructions are usually part of the information you'll find there—all to assure the best kind of care for the particular garment."

Some manufacturers are even putting a "wear-dated" guarantee on their labels. Look for them; one company guarantees that if the garment does not wear as expected, the label, dated sales slip and garment should be returned to the company for a refund or exchange.
