Well driller Don Foreman of Estacada and his problems with the new Heppner city well came under discussion again at the City Council meeting Monday night, but the council deferred any action.

Other routine business matters came before the council at its regular monthly meeting. City attorney P. W. Mahoney told the council he had written to Foreman's insurance company, telling them Foreman had abandoned the well and the contract with the city.

However, the insurance company told Mahoney the driller had not abandoned the well, but was waiting for a special tool to arrive to fish out broken casing in the hole.

Rodeo Board Outlines Plans

The traditional Wranglers Cowboy Breakfast will not be held at the fairgrounds during the 1969 Heppner Rodeo, the Morrow county rodeo board learned at its regular meeting last Wednesday night.

The breakfast, held on Saturday morning of the rodeo, will either be held at the Heppner city park or at the Courthouse. Wranglers president and board member Bill Healy, told directors.

The NRA rodeo is scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, August 23 and 24, with three performances during the two days.

At the meeting, the board was told that advance tickets for the shows are now on sale at Heppner business establishments. Tickets are priced at \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children for the Saturday and Sunday afternoon shows, while Saturday night prices are \$1.00 for adults and 50c for children.

Other routine business was discussed at the meeting, ranging from making medical arrangements to making publicity arrangements.

The directors discussed hiring a trick roper to perform during the afternoon shows, but deferred signing a contract until more information is received.

An arrangement between the Heppner show and one at Tygh Valley which conflicts with dates was also discussed. Saddle bronc riders would be shuttled by plane during the two rodeos to allow more competition in both shows.

Under the set-up used last year, bronc riders would ride at the beginning of the Tygh Valley show, then fly to Heppner to compete in the last of the show here Saturday.

Sunday, the situation would be reversed. No definite arrangements have been made, it was noted at the meeting.

The board also approved a \$10 entry fee for the cowgirl race, making fees required on all races except pony races. Director Don Evans explained the fee would allow more definite plans for the race.

Entry fees close for all events at 8 p.m., August 21.

—Referred to the personnel committee the matter of paying city employees overtime for flood work, and
—Discussed insurance on small pieces of equipment.
