Since the ZIP Code system tends to reflect transportation patterns and patterns of merce, the statistical material in the new publication will be especially useful in approximating Oregon's marketing or com-

muting areas, Erickson said. All of the area tabulations in the publication are identified by the first three digits of the five digit ZIP Code. Of the 837 listings, 199 are for large cities and other 638 for suburban or rural areas.

For each ZIP Code area listing, the IRS publication includes a tabulation by size of income, of the number of returns filed, number of joint returns filed by husbands and wives, number of exemptions claimed for taxpayers and their families, adjusted gross income, and total tax li-
