# Bank Earnings Show Good Climb

First National Bank of Ore-gon's earnings for the first six months of 1969 increased 28 per cent over last year's total and established a record first-half high for the statewide banking system, President Ralph J. Voss

has announced.

Voss reported net operating earnings for the period ending June 30 totaled \$7,168,378 as compared with \$5,605,241 a year ago. The record earnings figure is equivalent to \$2.25 per share compared with \$1.77 for the first half of 1968, which reflected the federal surtax and was adjusted for a 12½ per cent stock dividend paid in March of that year.

Deposits, loans and total resources also continued to soar to new highs. Deposits on June 30 totaled \$1,628,005,362, an increase of \$198,465,466, or 14 per cent over the mid-year figures of \$1,429,539,896 recorded in
