Employment Tax Deadline Near

Employers have an important tax deadline on July 31, 1969, according to A. G. Erickson, District Director of Internal Revenue Service in Oregon.

This is the last day for reporting and paying both Social Security and withheld income taxes for the quarter ending June 30, 1969.

Employers should report these taxes on the IRS preaddressed Form 941 mailed them. They have until July 31 to file their return.

If the balance due with the return is more than \$100, it should be deposited in a Federal Reserve Bank or authorized commercial banks, using Form 501 which is available only from the Internal Revenue Service Center, Ogden, Utah. Lesser amounts can be sent with the return.

The completed Form 941 should be mailed to: Internal Revenue Service Center, 1160 W. 1200 South Street, Ogden, Utah, 84405.

Rubber Raft Users Warned of Danger

The State Marine Board is cautioning users of rubber rafts that the State Boating Law classifies these as boats, and consequently each person on board such a raft must have a Coast Guard-approved lifesaving device.

During the past several months there has been a rash of accidents, with three fatalities, caused when these rafts capsized in the ocean surf or on one of the state's inland rivers. The rafts capsized in the rivers after hitting submerged rocks or snags.

In addition to the three fatalities, law enforcement agencies have reported some near-fatalities; and in a very recent one on the Sandy River, it took four hours to recover the survivors of an accident. In effecting the rescue, the sheriff's patrol boat was seriously damaged.

Log Exports Up in May

Softwood log exports from the Washington, Oregon, northern California, and Alaska Customs Districts totaled 184 million board feet Scribner log scale, in May, 1969, according to data just received by the U. S. Forest Service Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station in Portland. This volume represents an increase of 10.4 percent from April, 1969 exports but a 14.8-percent decline from shipments in May of last year.

Log shipments from Washington and Oregon totaled 165 million board feet, up 17.0 percent from exports in April but 10.4 percent below shipments made in May, 1968. Northern California exports decreased from the April figure of 25.2 million board feet to 14.3 million board feet, and Alaska shipments rose from 489,000 board feet in April to 4.6 million board feet in May. Japan received 168 million board feet, or 91.0 percent of total shipments from the four states.

Douglas fir made up 19.4 percent of May log exports, and Port-Orford cedar 1.5 percent. The remaining 79.1 percent was other softwoods, primarily western hemlock and true firs. Total value of the log shipments was \$19.1 million, and the average value was \$103.68 per thousand board feet. Douglas fir averaged \$99.05 per thousand board feet; Port-Orford cedar, \$344.09; and other softwoods, \$103.68.

Wick has not regained consciousness and there has been no change in his condition. Doctors have not found the cause for his lapse, according to Mrs. Roxie Lovgren.
