

City Water Storage Tank Delivered to Irrigon Site

IRRIGON—The 30,000-gallon storage tank for the City Water System was delivered to the well site and placed on the foundation Saturday. Built by Northrop Steel Fabricating Co. at their shop north of Hermiston, the tank was moved complete except for plumbing hookup and placed on the oiled foundation by house mover Andy Gust of Boardman.

The ground level reservoir measures 17 feet in diameter and is 13 feet high, with contract price being \$9,302. The system will be put into use in late August. Fifty-six patrons have applied for service.

State Horse Show Entries to Close

The All America Horse Show premium lists for the Oregon State Fair were mailed July 25 according to William Turnquist, assistant fair manager and horse show director. Entries close August 8.

Leading stables from throughout the west will be competing in 264 classes held in the 3,000 seat stadium. The ultimate in horsemanship will be seen in this event approved by the following associations: American Horse Show Assoc.; A-rated with the Pacific Coast Horse, Jumping and Stock Horse Assoc.; American Quarter Horse Assoc.; Oregon Horsemen's Assoc.; Horse Show Assoc. of Washington; and various other breed associations. Judges for the show are: Marion Brown, of Florissant, Mo., judging saddlehorse, Walking Horses, Ponies; Alex Forman, of Mendham, N. J., judging Hunters and Jumpers; Charles F. Zimmerman, of Houston, Texas, judging Western, Arabian and Quarter Horses.

A nostalgic event will be the re-instating of the draft horse hitch. Pairs, and teams of four, sixes, and eights will be shown in a driving competition for teams of sixes. There will be a class for singles driven to appropriate two or four-wheeled vehicles, Irish jogging carts, gigs, and other interesting carts, some dating back to the 1800's will be used.

Other features of the horse show will be the Northwest Saddlebred Association's Futurity which will be held Monday morning, September 1—Labor Day—and at 6 p.m. the same day the Northwest Draft Horse Pulling Championship.

The first two days of the 10-day event will be the Junior Show for riders 17 and under. The Open Show begins with matinee performances Monday, August 25. Matinees start at 1:30 p.m., evening performances at 7:30 p.m.

Nine evening and five matinee performances of the All America Horse Show will be interspersed with the World Championship Rodeo. There will be no admission charge for other morning and evening performances including the Northwest Draft Horse Pulling contest at 6 p.m. on Labor Day.

The Fair opens August 23 and runs through September 1.

Umatilla Fair Is Next Week

A new feature in the Junior Rodeo this year is the riding of Brahma bulls for the older boys. The Junior Rodeo competition is for boys and girls, 8-18, who pay entry fees and compete for prize money in 13 events.
