



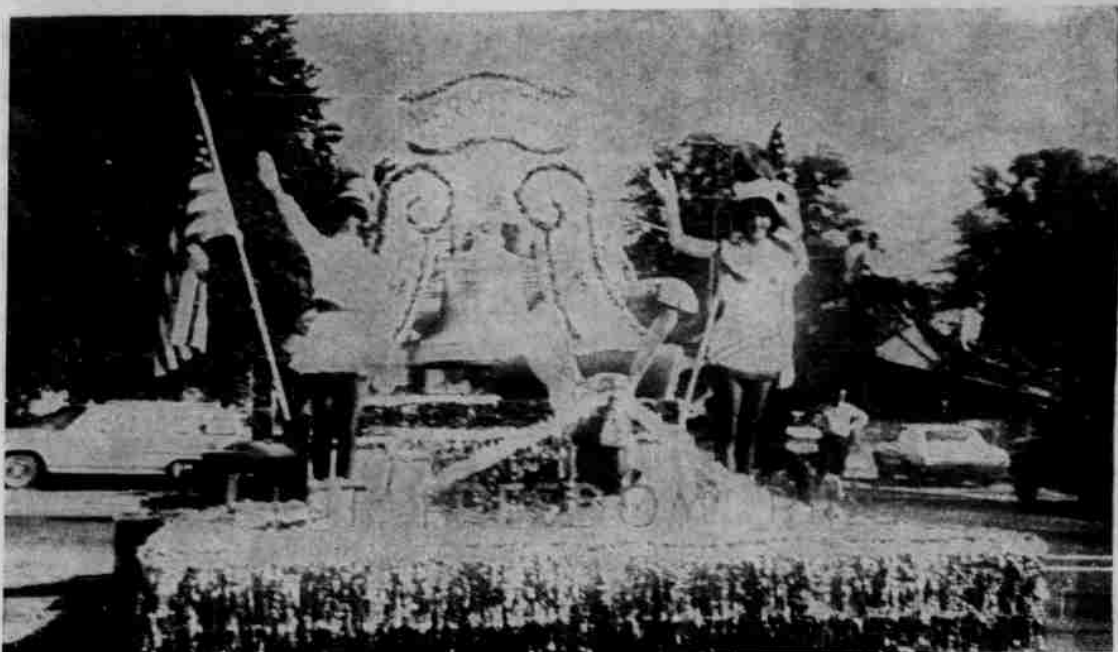

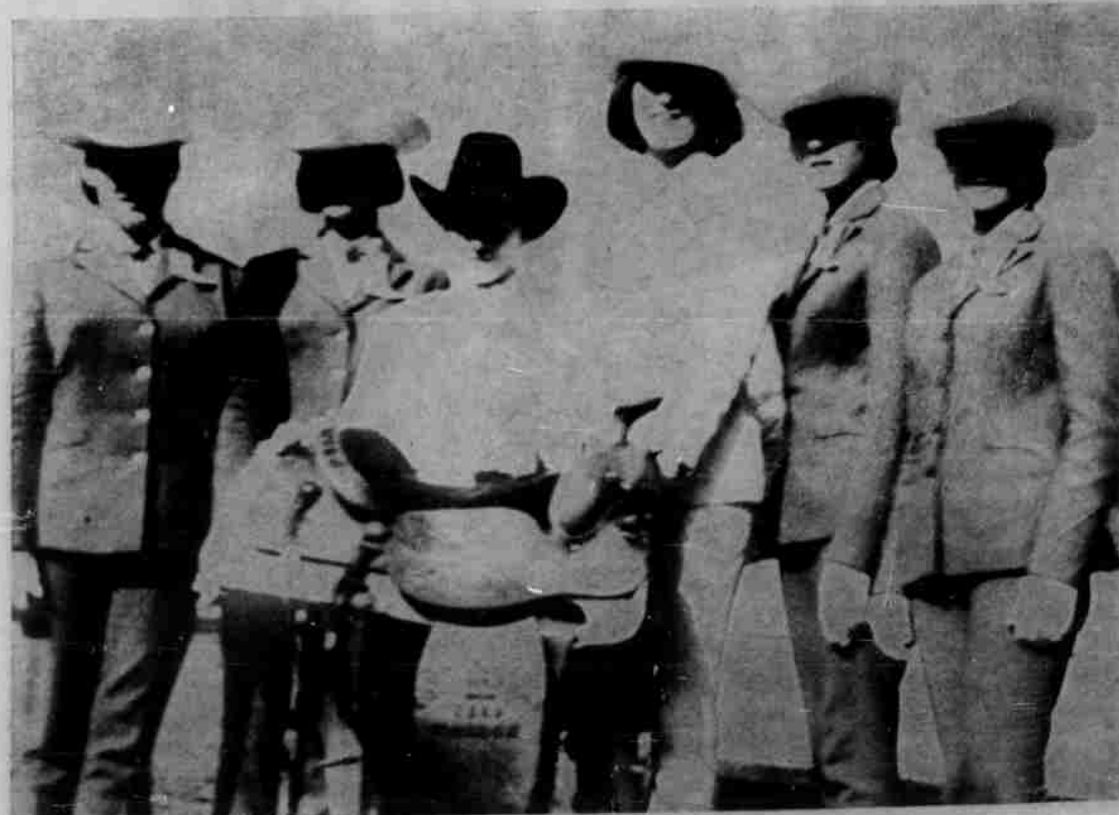
BEST OUT-OF-TOWN FLOAT at the Grand Street Parade was this entry from Hermiston, with the theme "Let Freedom Ring."
