Football Practices Start at Heppner, Lone High Schools

It's that time again. Footballs are in the air at Heppner and Lone High schools as the teams prepare for opening games Saturday, Sept. 13.

The Mustangs go against the Elgin Huskies here at 8 that night, while the Cardinals travel to Dufur for a 2 p.m. contest.

Fourty-three prospective players answered HHS coach Ed Hiemstra's call to practice, while 20 are out at Lone under head coach Gordon Meyers.

The Mustangs suffered their first loss of the season Wednesday night in practice, when John McCabe, who figured heavily in Hiemstra's plans, suffered a torn cartilage in his shoulder.

"I'll probably hold him out the first game," Hiemstra said. The coach indicated the injury was not very serious.

M McCabe, a returning letterman, is one of several players who could lead the HHS crew on a comeback campaign after a dismal season last year.

And if desire is any indication of their strength, the Mustangs will have plenty.

"The kids are really hitting hard," the coach said. "They are very eager."

Hiemstra has divided the squad into two teams, and the Mustangs will play a full junior varsity schedule.

Dale Conklin, former head coach at Klickitat, Wash., will head the jayvees, while Hiemstra and Dean Naffziger are the varsity coaches.

The Mustangs lost only two men of the 1968 starting offensive unit through graduation, so the first string remains almost intact.

Lee Huson and Matt Murray, both all-Greater Oregon League starters, will return at ends to bolster the line.

Hal Bergstrom and Rick Marquardt are both back at the tackle spots, while all-league honorable mention Tom Cutsforth returns at center.

Terry Hughes and David Wright, who both played at guard last season are returning. Hiemstra's big problem is finding a quarterback, the same problem he faced last year.

Dean Wright, a junior who last year was a running back, has been playing the quarterback spot in drills this week.

The coach had praise for Rory Stillman, hard-hitting sophomore running back, after Wednesday's practice.

"He was really hitting hard," Hiemstra said.

Other backfield prospects include Bruce Marquardt, Kevin Dick and John Hall.

Hiemstra said he would carry 20 men on the varsity team, but will suit up 11 jayvees for the varsity contests.

Madras and Wahatoka are expected to have the toughest teams in the Western division of the league, Hiemstra said.

The Mustangs face Wahatoka October 10, and entertain Madras for Homecoming Oct. 31.

Pilot Rock will provide the opposition for the HHS squad's first league encounter on Oct. 3. Non-league contests other than the opener include Enterprise and Condon.

First junior varsity game is set for Sept. 15, against Pilot Rock here. Five more games are scheduled, according to HHS athletic director Bob Clough.

At Lone, it will be a building year for the Cardinals, but Meyers thinks they may surprise a few people.

Of the 20 out, only two have more than one year experience, end Scott Wilson and guard Ron Christopherson.

"We'll be inexperienced," Meyers said, "but I'm kind of encouraged."

The team is eager, he said, and are "doing pretty well."

Eight freshmen are out for the squad, and five sophomores provide the bulk of the team.

"I'm kind of impressed with some of these freshmen," the coach noted. "I'm well satisfied with their hitting."

The Cards will have three non-league encounters, then face Riverside in their first league game.

And Meyers expects the Pirates to be one of the toughest clubs in the league. Weston will also be tough, he said.

Besides Wilson and Christopherson, other seniors out are Terry Cannon, Gene Crowell and Joe McEligott. Juniors are Victor Klinger and Pete McEligott.

Sweepstakes in the Grain Division at the Fair was won by Bill Rawlins. Awarded on the basis of total ribbon points won, Rawlins has been named "Grain Man of the Year" for 1969.

Grain entered by Rawlins received five first place ribbons. A new award, a silver tray, was given Rawlins by the Oregon State fair officials.

wheat in the commercial grain class won blue ribbons for Rawlins. Other first place entries were for hard red winter wheat (bulk), red wheat (sheaves), and miscellaneous sheaves in the "any other variety" class.

Five Morrow county farmers other than Rawlins also won blue awards in the grain division. Roland Bergstrom received a first place for eastern winter barley. William Rill won with his eastern soft white wheat exhibit. R. W. Bergstrom, six-row

barley (bulk), Jerry Dougherty, hard white wheat (bulk) and Bob Jepsen, club wheat (sheaves) and white wheat (sheaves).

Thirteen young people from Morrow county also won first place ribbons with their entries.

Karen Richards, Irrigon, took champion honors for her Montadale sheep. She received blue ribbons for her ewe lamb, producing ewe, ewe and lamb, and club member's flock.

Robert Richards was co-champion in the "other breeds and crossbreeds" class. Blue ribbons were awarded to David Richards and to Robert.

Shauna Bergstrom placed first in the intermediate style revue held Sunday, August 24. Christina Lindstrom won a blue award in the knitting style revue held Thursday, August 28.

A one layer plain butter cake entered in the food adventures class won a first place award for Shannon Kelly.

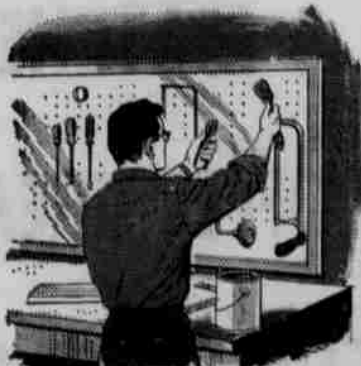

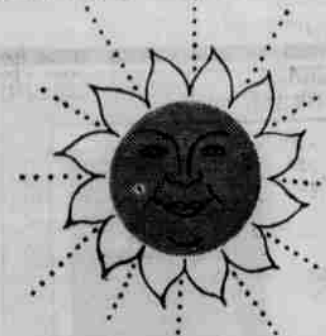

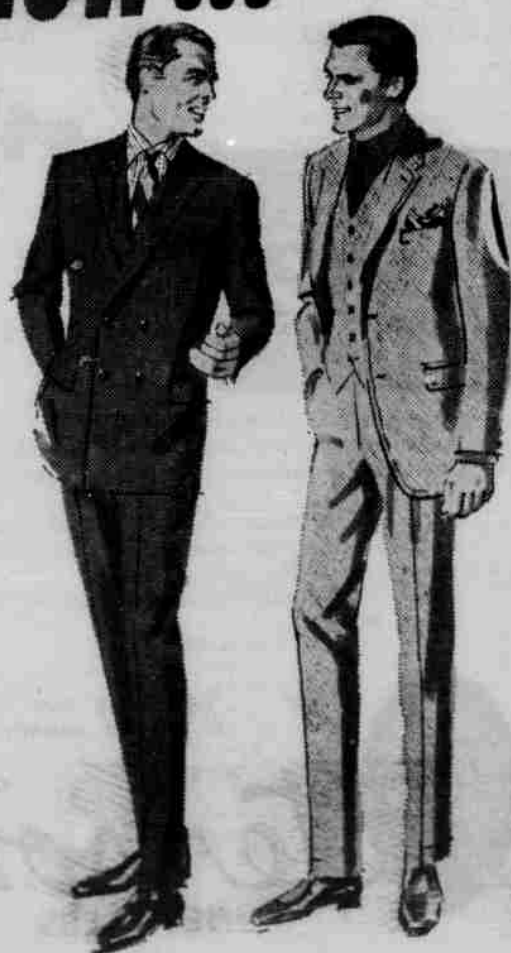
