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**Drug Analysis** Offered Parents By Police Labs

State Police Superintendent Holly V. Holcomb announced on September 2, that in an effort to aid parents who have reason to believe their children may be using narcotics or dangerous drugs, may now leave suspected substances for analysis by the State Crime Detection Laboratory at any State Police office in the state. Any information so obtained will be kept confidential between the parents and the tial between the parents and the State Police.

It was explained that on oc casion parents will note unus-ual changes in the personality and habits of their children, which may indicate drug usage, and will observe unidentified tablets, capsules, powders and vegetable material in the cloth-ing or in possession of their children.

Under the program announce ed, a parent may take such ma-terial to a State Police office and leave it for laboratory analand leave it for laboratory analysis. The parent need not leave his name, but will be assigned a number. After approximately ten days, the parent may call the office where the material was left without revealing his identity, using only the number assigned, and will be informed of the result of the analysis. In the event the material is identified as narcotics or dangerous drugs, the parent will be warned of the probability of usage by the child and can arrange through his physician for any indicated medical assistance
