

Port of Morrow Considers Industrial Tract

BOARDMAN—The Port of Morrow commissioners indicated at a meeting last week that they have been approached on locating a feedlot here and Rupert Kennedy, port manager, said he felt it would be well to set up an agriculture-industrial park. The port is developing a waterfront industrial tract which already has attracted the Docken alfalfa curing plant.

Dewey West, commission chairman, said it is possible the port could trade for land more remote from populated areas that would be suitable for feedlots or any other type of animal connected business. Other possibilities could be a packing plant, or one utilizing animal wastes. The commissioners indicated this region, as irrigation develops, is due for growth in feeding of all types of animals. Kennedy was given permission by the board to start negotiating for a suitable park site. The port commissioners expressed satisfaction with progress toward moving the Navy off the Boardman Bombing Range. They hope the land will become available about the same time a nuclear power plant site is approved in Morrow county.

The commissioners told Kennedy to make the state an offer for about 20 acres of submersible land along the Columbia River for industrial waterfront property.

The land is located north of the waterfront park and stretches about a mile up the river. Kennedy said he hoped the industrial park where the alfalfa plant is located will have power and water soon. An old well has been reamed and is ready for pumping equipment. Umatilla Electric Cooperative is putting power to the park.

In other action the Port approved a deed allowing Kennedy to purchase the former Union Pacific depot as a home site.

The commissioners also agreed to contribute \$250 in dues to the Oregon Association of Ports, but questioned whether the dues are not too high for small ports.

The commissioners felt they should delay any move to acquire waterfront land owned by the Paterson Ferry Corporation.
