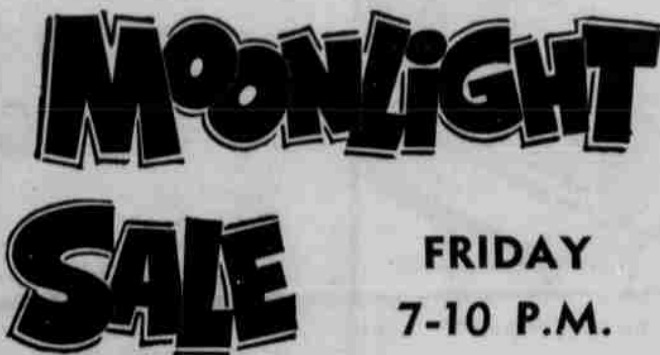

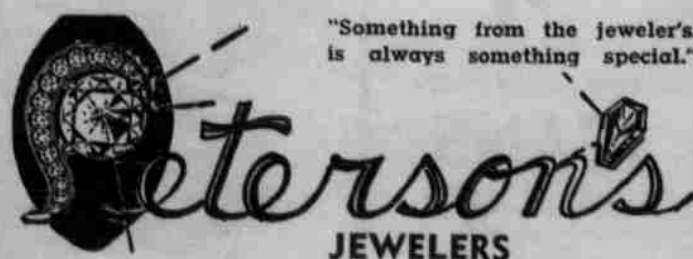

**Mounted Wildlife
Is Big Addition
To Local Museum**

Visitors to the Morrow County Museum are now enjoying the new addition to the building which is now completed. It consists of two rooms built on the East end next to the Willow Creek, and donated by Mrs. Amanda Duvall. One large room has relieved the overflow of the crowded main museum rooms. The other new smaller room is filled with an interesting variety of all kinds of mounted trophies, birds, animals and furs, consisting of more than 65 mounts of Oregon wildlife. The major part of this collection are new from the Whitman Taxidermy of Pendleton, purchased by Mrs. Duvall and placed there last week.

The public is invited to see the new additions when the museum is open Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and on Sundays from 2 to 5 p.m. Mrs. Rachel Harnett serves as curator of the museum, taking pride in collecting and displaying exhibits pertaining to Morrow county history.
