## Council Reviews Water Projects

**IRRIGON**—Mayor Chester Wilson gave a report on the Water System at the September council meeting on September 9. The reason given for delay in completing the small amount of work left on the project was procurement and delivery problems of some of the control components.

Construction of a line, north of Oregon Avenue on 7th Street, will be included before the project is finished.

Other business included routine payment of bills and discussion of a wide range of items which touched on street lights and weed control. It was noted that two late spraying of streets and roadways had been very effective in killing puncture vine. An earlier effort in forthcoming years was suggested to eliminate their seeding.

A letter was read from Union Pacific Railroad stating the city's application for a crossing over their tracks at 10th Street had been declined. This was to have given access into the new park area being developed by the Corps of Engineers who have already constructed their roadway connecting 10th Street which is to be the only access into the park. This information is to be forwarded to the Corps of Engineers, with suggestion that they present the problem to the railroad.

Richard Stanley submitted his resignation verbally to the Council, stating there is a conflict of working conditions which make it difficult for him to attend the meetings. Appointment to fill the vacancy was deferred to a later date.

An Ordinance to provide for manner of financing later construction of water mains and laterals will be on the agenda for October. City Council meetings are always on the second Tuesday of the month. Anyone is welcome to attend.
