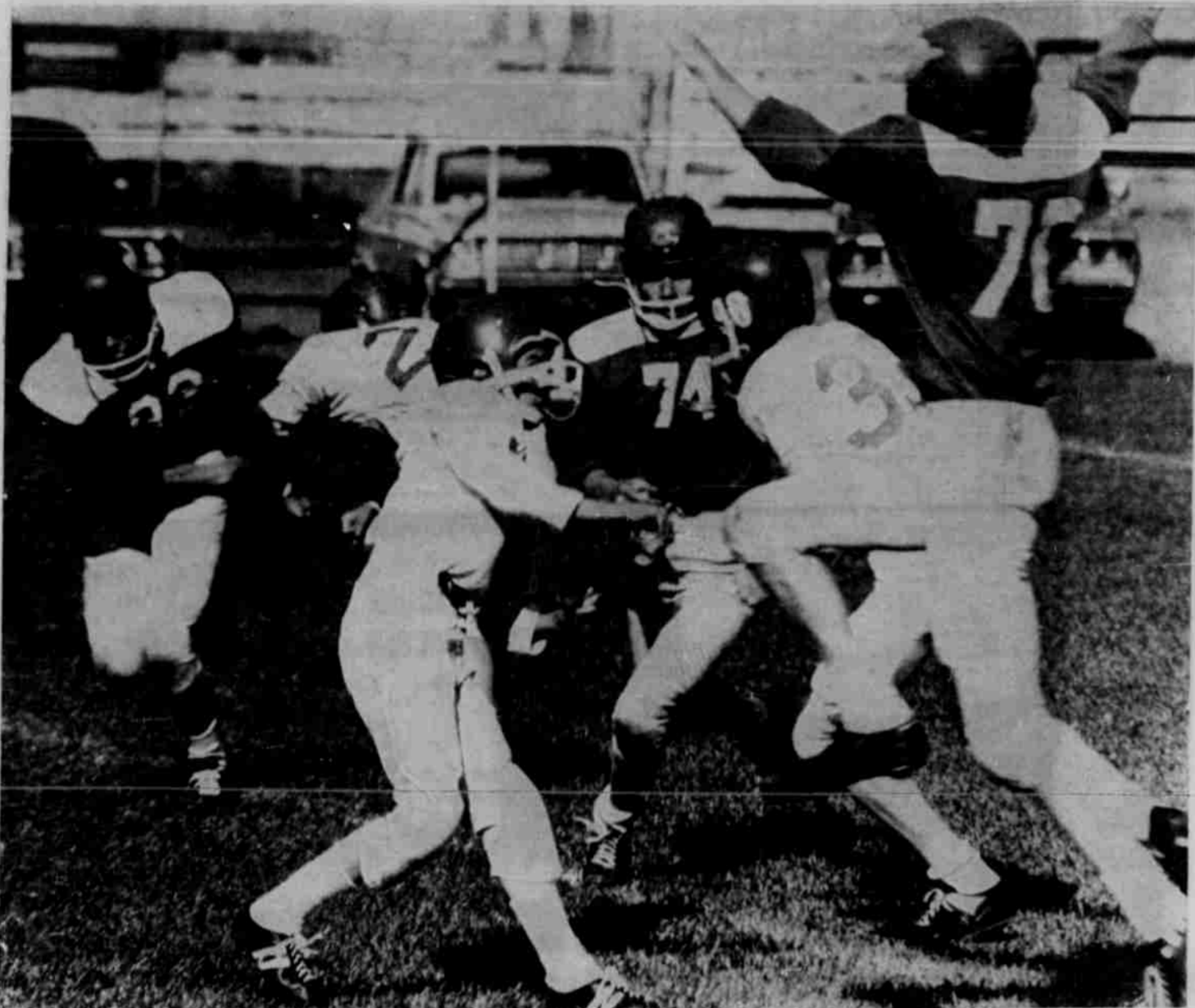


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Riverside Trims Cardinals 14-12; Helix Here Next

The lone Cardinals were defeated in their first league game 28-12 by the Riverside Pirates on Friday, October 3, on their home field.

The two teams were evenly matched during the first half, with the Pirates leading only 14-12. But the Cards were unable to get on the scoreboard again.

The Pirates scored on runs of 5, 6, 7 and 18 yards. The Cards' only tallies came in the first quarter when Terry Cannon passed to Joe McElligott for a 52-yard play, and Doug Beggs ran 51 yards to score. Both point tries failed.

Riverside racked up 266 yards rushing, to Ione's 65.

Passing yardage was equal, with both teams throwing for 67 yards.

Action this week brings the Helix Grizzlies to Ione on Friday, October 10, at 2:30 for a Homecoming battle.

Mustangs Stomp Rockets In League Opener 41-16

Starting league play off with a bang, the Heppner High Mustangs stomped the Pilot Rock Rockets by a decisive 41-16 score Friday, on the Heppner gridiron.

Coach Ed Hjemstra commented that the boys played like they loved the game.

A preview of the game was given on the first series of downs.

The Mustangs received the opening kickoff and drove 49 yards in 8 plays. Dean Wright ended it with a 14-yard run. Two points were then added with a pass from John McCabe to John Hall.

John McCabe recovered a fumble, which set up another Mustang score, to start the second quarter. A 50-yard drive was then in the making. The Mustangs racked up 3 first downs, then a 20-yard dunker from Watkins to Huson set up a half-yard plunge over the goal line by John Hall. The PAT failed.

Heppner stopped the Rockets on four downs. Three plays later, Bill Quaempts intercepted a Mustang pass and galloped 45 yards for Pilot Rock's first score. Quaempts then ran the PAT.

The Mustangs' next series of downs was full of excitement. The Rockets held them to four downs. Heppner punted, but a penalty against the Rockets gave the Mustangs new life. They capitalized on the mistake and drove 45 yards for another touchdown. John Hall again scored, with a 5-yard run. The PAT was blocked.

The next score was a 3-yard dive by Bruce Marquardt. Marquardt also added the kick for the PAT. This ended the first half scoring, with the Mustangs on top, 27-8.

The Rockets were the first to score in the third quarter. Bill Quaempts threw a pass to Tom Michaels, then ran the PAT.

The Mustangs came back to form on offense, hitting paydirt again as Hall scored his third touchdown, on a 3-yard run.

In the fourth quarter Dean Wright scored his second touchdown, on a 13-yard plunge. John McCabe threw to John Hall for two extra points which ended the scoring for the evening. The final score was Heppner 41, the

visiting Rockets 16.

Heppner led in yardage with 311. Pilot Rock gained 201 yards. First downs were also dominated by Heppner. The Mustangs had 13 and Pilot Rock 8.

Outstanding player in the game was Lee Huson. He was great on both offense and defense.

Also named for their heads-up football were offensive linemen Bruce Marquardt and Dave Wright and defensive lineman Matt Murray.

John Hall was tabbed outstanding back both offensively and defensively.

Dean Wright shared the honor on offense and John McCabe on defense.

The Mustangs' next game will be a league encounter on Friday, October 10, at Wahtonka.

Powerline Shooting Has Costly Results

"Shooting at insulators and powerlines is a deadly game," warns L. A. Moore, Bonneville Power administrator.

"A lineman climbing a pole can be killed if a cracked insulator causes a high voltage wire to fall. So can anyone else it happens to touch—including the irresponsible marksman."

Cooperation of all hunters has been asked, and warnings are given that powerline clearings are no place for target practice.

Each year bullet damage to insulators and powerlines causes inconveniences, and sometimes real danger and hardship to many innocent people.

Homes where there are young children, or perhaps a person seriously ill, are left without light and heat. Industry and business literally close down until repairs are made. This can take several hours, or even longer. Conceivably a patient in a hospital operating room, iron lung or oxygen tent could die.

Malicious damage to transmission facilities is a serious federal offense. Federal law requires that each such instance be reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Conviction on such charges is subject to fines and imprisonment. Similar damage to public or private utility lines and structures is subject to prosecution under applicable state, county or local statutes.
