Season Opening About Average With No Mishaps

Hunter successes over the opening week-end of deer season in the Heppner district were comparable with the past two years in most areas, officials reported Monday.

However, number of hunters reporting at road checks showed a drop. Those in Wheeler and Gilliam counties were reporting an increase. The "invading army" in this area seemed to be of the "weekend" variety.

Although the deer kill was down some, general conditions of those bagged were bigger and fatter, due to good forage and water during the summer months, game officials said.

State officials stated there were few difficulties experienced, no fatal accidents or deaths in the district, and no one lost.

A minor accident, not directly connected with hunting, was reported after a hunter had seriously torn a finger while working with a piece of equipment in camp. He was brought to Pioneer Memorial hospital for emergency treatment. And, adding insult, it was his "trigger" finger.

One hunter was arrested for illegally killing a bull elk on Potamus Point. It was brought in good shape to Central Market and will be issued to welfare or through the Neighborhood Center.

At road checks a few grouse, quail and pheasant were confiscated.

Hunters, in general, were doing an excellent job caring for their meat, and had been careful with fires.

A little below the average of deer had been brought to the local markets for cutting by the middle of this week, Ernie McCabe, butcher at Central Market, said they had received 34 compared with about 40 during an average year at this time. Leonard Schwarz of Court Street Market said they would not be processing deer this year, but do have a few in storage.

Hunters experienced snow in some of the camping areas, and many were not prepared for the cold. Forest officials said there were a number who left camps early due to inadequate camping facilities and cover for low night temperatures.

Director Challenges Soroptimists in Talk During Official Visit

District Director Dorothy Berry of Portland made her official visit before the Soroptimist club of Heppner at its regular business meeting last Thursday noon.

Mrs. Berry was visiting clubs in the area while en route to the fall convention of District 2, Northwestern Region, held Saturday and Sunday in La Grande, and attended by several local club members.

The director, in her talk following the business meeting, had words of praise for extension work carried on by clubs within the district. Several new clubs are being chartered during this biennium, she announced, including Milwaukie and Junction City, and to be chartered soon are clubs in Pendleton and Beaverton.

"Soroptimism is good for everyone—the community, the nation, the world and us," she pointed out. "It is an answer to 'what is happiness?' as it calls on members to use all of your talents in a very highest cause, making best use of abilities and opportunities to improve the individual self, and to serve those about you."

Service through Soroptimism provides women with an incentive to "break through the crust of the ages," she noted, using and directing their power to overcome inefficiencies and injustices. Women are helped by having a natural intuition and can thereby be sympathetic to international social problems. The fact that \$50,000 was contributed last year to help overseas refugees emphasized this point.

During the business period, with Mrs. Vi Lanham presiding, committee reports were heard. Plans for Christmas gift to be sent to the sister club in Folkstone, England, were discussed. Also, the ways and means committee is planning for the annual Turkey Hop for high school and college youth on November 29.

Initiation for two new members, Mrs. Bettie Doherty and Mrs. Alice Soward, is planned for Thursday, October 16, at the noon meeting.

Final plans for travel to the district convention were discussed. The Heppner club assisted with the Saturday evening banquet by providing individual table favors of miniature owls.

Forsythe Service Held in Portland

Memorial services were held Tuesday, October 7, in Portland for Erma Cornett Forsythe, who died October 1 in Belleville, Ill., after an extended illness.

Mrs. Forsythe was born October 5, 1919, in Sheridan, Wyo. She was the daughter of Mack L. Cornett and Mary Sims Cornett.

On February 11, 1942, she was married to John A. Forsythe in Ashland, Ore. Following flight training Forsythe served in the United States Air Force in England. Mrs. Forsythe lived with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. C. Forsythe, in Ashland and after they moved to Ione in 1943.

After his discharge from the service Forsythe established the Lexington Airport. Shortly before the opening of the Korean War the family moved to Portland, where they lived until January, 1967, when Forsythe returned to active duty at Scott Air Force Base, Belleville.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Forsythe is survived by two children. Lynn is in the Air Force temporarily assigned to Scott Air Force base. He has been in Okinawa for over a year. A daughter, Mrs. Stan (Nancy) Usinger, lives in Portland. Two brothers, Ernest and Russell, also survive.

Memorial services were held last week at Scott Air Force base.

Among those attending services in Portland were Mr. Forsythe's sister, Mrs. L. E. (Rachel) Dick and Mr. Dick.
