Spoiling Wahtonka's Homecoming, Heppner High's Mustangs pranced to a convincing 18-6 victory over the Eagles Friday, October 11. Heppner did all its scoring in the first half, racking up the 18 points on three touchdowns.

The Eagles tallied 6 points in the third quarter on a 21-yard run by Bob Tenold.

Heads-up Mustang play paid off in two touchdowns in the second quarter. Lee Huson sparked from the line of scrimmage to block an Eagle punt. Matt Murray fell on the ball and the Mustangs took over in great field position on the Eagles' 3. On the next play John Hall trotted in for the score.

With only a few seconds left in the half, Watkins fired a pass from the 39-yard line, hitting Murray on the 10. Hit immediately, Murray fumbled the ball, which was scooped up by Hall who scampered over the nearby goal line for another 6-pointer.

The first tally was a re-run of the Heppner-Pilot Rock action. The Mustangs received the opening kickoff and after eight running plays, Dean Wright dove through to paydirt.

The Eagles tried to get a drive going but after nine plays were stopped. This was Wahtonka's main threat for the first half.

Tenold's touchdown for the Eagles was the only scoring action in the second half, in which otherwise the teams played on fairly even terms. The Mustangs drove to the Eagles' ten-yard line at the close of the game. Held for downs, Heppner tried a field goal which came close to adding another three points just as the gun went off.

Comparative yardage figures Heppner gaining 259 yards to Wahtonka's 141.

Four boys swept all of the honors for outstanding play for Heppner. Offensive and defensive standouts in the line were Lee Huson and Matt Murray.

Star backs were John Hall and John McCabe. Murray was named the most valuable player for the game.

Jayvees Combine To Beat Pirates

Have you ever seen an eight-man-eleven man football game both at the same time?

This is what the Baby Mustangs and the Riverside Pirates played Monday evening, October 13.

When the Mustangs were on offense they played eleven men against an eleven man Riverside defense, and on defense the Mustangs played eight men against the Pirates eight man offense.

Beryl Stillman scored both of the Heppner touchdowns in the 16-14 Mustang win. The first TD came on the second play of the game. Allen McCabe scored the points-after on both of the touchdowns.

Late in the second quarter the Pirates scored on a 50-yard pass play. With 10 seconds left in the game Riverside scored another TD, on another long pass connection.

"We finally got our offense rolling," said Coach Dale Conklin. The Baby Mustangs piled up 318 yards, most of them from two long plays.

Coach Conklin praised the efforts of Beryl Stillman, who ran for 236 yards in 32 carries for an average of 7.7 yards per carry. Also cited for outstanding play were McCabe, Dallas Harsin and Bill Jepsen. The Baby Mustangs are 1-4 for the season.
